Before my family decided to pull one name from a bag,



everyone bought gifts for more than ten people. Our Christmas Eve tradition of sharing gifts after singing carols and feasting from a table loaded with Swedish yuletide food continues, but the mountains of wrapping paper, boxes, packaging ...

has diminished considerably. So did the stress of trying to find a gift each person would like. My mother resisted this change for years. Finally the amount of shopping became too much for her to get done without physical suffering.

As a child I could not wait for the hour when we could open our gifts. As an adult I increasingly dreaded the excess, except when I had found something special for someone and enjoyed the surprise and gratitude that the gift provided. Many gifts have delighted me--the afghan my sister crocheted, the painting, a framed photograph ... When we first proposed the change in gift giving, my sisters and I wanted us all to donate money to a charitable organization in the name of the chosen one, but that strayed too far from tradition for my mother. As matriarch we honor her need for tradition, but we are all thankful for this simplification of the holidays.

I wonder, "What makes something a gift?" In its original Old Norse usage, gipt meant to give something to someone without expecting anything in return. While this definition still applies in our culture, I think of the woolen blankets infected with smallpox given to the Kansa Indians as gifts to decimate their population, so European settlers could rule this land. It is hard not to think of oil lobbyists without thinking of the 3 billion people on this earth who live on \$2 or less a day. Inequities in the world have worsened in the last 25 years. Most of the poor are children. This makes me weep. The gift of our "Helping Hands Sundays" brings a smile.

At its most pure I think of the Fellowship as a gift for each person who becomes involved with its life. It is a gift we give each other; it is the gift of being yourself without fear of being judged or demeaned for your beliefs, sexual orientation, or lifestyle. Whether you are more Scrooge than playful, helpful elf, our true and evolving selves are a gift we can give each other. This requires belief in oneself and the community--the courage and encouragement to be true. I wonder what expectations based on UUFM's cultural traditions might limit this gift, cause suffering; what is given with strings attached or not given at all? When we return to our first Unitarian Universalist principle calling us to respect the inherent worth and dignity of each person and circle to the seventh which asks us to respect the interdependent web of existence of which we are all a part, it leads us in our personal and communal quest to live a life of meaning and wholeness. This circling brings authenticity to the self and community--hopefully expanding by the giving and receiving of each other's gifts by more and more people.

Let us give our gifts thoughtfully and with abiding compassion. No matter what your disposition, may merry and bright moments punctuate your day!

## **REFLECTIONS** - MARIA SNYDER, DRE, Nov 25, 2008



It has been an exciting first month on the job. I want to thank everyone for welcoming me, giving me information, and helping me get settled.

I am learning my way around and beginning work on some exciting projects. I have spent some time in each of the classrooms getting to know the kids

and learning the routines from the teachers.

I also want to thank everyone who had their hand in creating my work space. I have a desk, an office chair, a computer, power, a phone and great bookshelves that will soon be in place. Stop by the stage and see the transformation of the DRE office space.

The first projects I am working on are communication, new teacher training, and a youth safety policy. Through the course of December and January you will begin to notice changes. You will soon begin seeing the topics to be covered in the RE rooms in the newsletter, the website, and a calendar of events in the hall. I am working on getting some volunteers to help us in the RE classrooms. These volunteers would assist us on rotating schedules to allow our core teachers to attend services. New volunteers would attend a new teacher-training course to learn about Unitarian Universalism and what to expect on Sundays. The youth safety policy will help us to protect our children and our volunteer workers.

I have met other DREs and have attended several meetings. I am making plans to continue to meet with people for feedback and personal growth, and to get resources to continue the growth of the RE program.

In the classrooms during December we are taking a break from the Timeless Traditions and getting into the spirit of the season. We will be learning about winter holidays from different faiths and traditions from all over the world. After the New Year we will pick back up where we left off with Timeless Traditions, learning about our Judeo-Christian heritage.

We started a note cards project that will be completed for the crafts fair [on December 14]. Make sure to stop by and see our hand painted cards. They are perfect to send as holiday cards, as gifts, or as decorative note cards for any occasion.

## **WORDS FROM OUR CHAIR**

Dear Fellowship Members and Friends,



Noteworthy Fellowship events this month included a membership committee meeting at the home of Kathleen and Scott Tanona. Jo Maseberg-Tomlinson presented ideas that she brought back

from the Fall PSD Conference in Des Moines, Iowa. We discussed how to fine-tune our welcoming and greeting of visitors. As a result of the discussion we assembled welcoming folders that include a copy of our monthly newsletter, an old copy of the *UU World*, information about our Fellowship life, a bookmark with the 7 Principles, and a questionnaire to be filled out by visitors if they choose to do so.

We also talked about the possibility of organizing Sunday morning responsibilities a bit differently. Many congregations our size have teams who share the Sunday morning tasks of greeting, preparing coffee and refreshments, flower arrangements, clean-up, etc. This way we will not need to have sign-up sheets for each of these tasks but have small teams of five individuals in place who will take care of the Sunday morning hospitality needs a few times each year. We may implement this approach some time this winter on a trial basis.

The Committee on Ministry, under the leadership of Emily Ragan and Pat Embers, in their meeting discussed many aspects of the ministry of the congregation including the possible advantages of consolidating the Membership and Welcoming, Caring, and Social Committees. I will invite the three committee chairs for another discussion of this topic with the goal to bring a recommendation for a consolidation of the committees before the Board.

In the monthly Executive Board meeting Eric Banner presented and we discussed at length the necessity to have a plan in place for the training, screening, and supervision of all our paid and volunteer staff who work

with our children. This is not only common practice for any program that works with children and youths but also a necessity for insurance coverage should a case of abuse arise. A Task Force under the leadership of RE Committee Chair Sandy Nelson and in collaboration with DRE Maria Snyder will work on a plan and present it to the Board in the January 2009 meeting.

On November 22, All Souls Unitarian Universalist Church in Kansas City together with the Lawrence Unitarian Fellowship celebrated the ordination of Jill Jarvis, who is the current SCORE minister and also serves UFL. It was a marvelous service with many well-wishers from regional UU congregations. The I-70 choir with Michael Oldfather conducting gave yet another wonderful choir concert at the event.

Please let us know how you think the Executive Board is doing and if you have any questions or concerns about Fellowship life.

## CAMP STARTRAIL 2009

If you're already dreaming about the warm, sunny days of Summer 2009, consider attending a UU camp, sponsored by the UUA's Prairie Star District.

Camp StarTrail will be held August 2 thru 7, 2009, near Omaha, Nebraska. Join us for a multigenerational camp that celebrates and explores Unitarian Universalism, in the beautiful rolling hills of the Platte River Valley. From the morning Celebration, to the workshops, to the evening Vespers and campfires, there will be fun and good conversation. If you'd prefer to sit in a rocking chair and read a good book, you'll enjoy the quiet of the woods, lake, and sky.

Costs are reasonable. A single adult would pay \$375 for registration, room and board, or higher for premium housing. Depending on what housing you choose, a family of four (two young adults, one child over four, one child under four) could pay just \$900 for a comfortable air con-



ditioned room with bunk beds; less expensive if you plan to camp out in your tent. Another family of four (2 adults, 1 teen over 13, 1 child over four) would pay \$1,300 or higher, depending on the housing you choose, or less if you camp. If you compare this to costs for attending Camp Unistar, you'll see it's comparable. If you compare this to a trip to the Grand Canyon or Yellowstone, it's much less. Additional options will include challenging ropes courses and trips to nearby museums.

Photos of the camp are available on the Prairie Star District Web site at www.psduua.org/CampStarTrail. We're renting a Lutheran camp for the week. There's a swimming pool, a small lake for canoes and paddleboats, and excellent food.
