In "White Crane," a magazine that explores gay wisdom and culture, I learned in the issue examining the meaning of sanctuary that "The Mountain," a UU retreat center in North Carolina, has hosted the "Gay Spirit Visions Conference" since it began in 1990. Thirty other retreat centers rejected their need to gather in



safety to share and seek wisdom. Andrew Ramer, who wrote the article "Into Loving Arms," detailed what makes this center a sanctuary for him. A prime reason is the "committed, devoted staff that has become family ... Each year they remind us we are as important to them as they are to us. In an often-hostile world such reminders are another of the Mountain's eye-moistening, heart-soothing gifts."

At the Topeka UU Fellowship's celebration of their new building on June 21st, eyes moistened as UU's across the southern cluster of the Prairie Star District joined UUFT to honor the hard work and devotion necessary to build their glorious addition. Their concrete commitment to provide space for the next generations of UU's to grow into their wisdom in a safe and caring place reminded all gathered of the power of community when it moves beyond individual boundaries to a shared vision; lifting up our voices of love and opening our arms to greater possibility.

Being a UU minister challenges me to learn how to love in the real world. The aggression and arrogance of any of us who want to push things through, brings me in direct contact with my own aggression and arrogance. Smugness and elitism does the same thing, as does indifference. Creating sanctuary requires people to expand small mindedness. In an often-hostile world we need to create "safe zones" where differences don't have to be hidden and we celebrate diversity by remaining open to change while love guides. This may sound like the blah, blah, blah of Hallmark card verses, but when I am dispirited because fellowship work overwhelms, becomes too challenging and my efforts seem unequal to the task; at some point when self pity becomes burdensome, I turn to love to help me understand how to practice compassion and openness. If my vision compresses and my work leads me from wisdom, then I

know the challenge is to defuse the pressure to keep loving kindness from being contracted into a hard line. While it may be easier to separate, it tends to compound ones reactivity, making one want to control more and more of what happens in their individual and communal lives. Spite is not a pretty thing.

In wisdom traditions the road to liberating truth is not through mindless passivity or the doctrinaire, "I am the one with the right answer" approach, but rather through an intelligent surrendering of one's fears to a larger inclusion, a dream that moves into reality, shaping the lives of all involved so that more is possible instead of less. This power navigates pessimism to a place where gladness has room to flourish. The yin side of this might be the empathy pouring forth from Fellowship members over George Marchin's unexpected death. Love teaches us to share in our joy and grief, to know as William Blake did, "that joy and woe are woven fine." Let us do the good work of finely weaving love together.

Abigail Conrad summed it up well in an email from Maine, "I know you and the UUFM family will be a great support to Anne; it is part of the reason we are all members ... to be there for each other when the world falls apart."

The 2010 UUFM Executive Board and Staff got off to a strong start with a June 5 Retreat, hosted by Brice and Shirley Hobrock. The agenda was ambitious but the discussion followed its own course when coupled with food and drink as the basis for getting acquainted, building cohesiveness,



and setting goals for the year. The discussion largely focused on membership and budget issues, largely our static, but high quality membership, and acquiring pledges necessary to support our staff and programs. Assessing the current state of the congregation, we acknowledged that great strides have been made, especially with religious education, pastoral care, social activities, programming, facilities, and social action. I believe that the congregational mood quotient is high.

The Board continued discussions of creative membership growth and meeting the 2010 Budget with sufficient pledges at its first formal meeting on June 9. The Finance Committee Chair, Mark Mayfield outlined the fact that we may be \$14,000 short of meeting our 2010 pledge goal of \$97,500. You will recall that our 2010 Budget was unanimously approved by the membership at the 2009 Annual Meeting in April. The Board also considered a Draft of a Past Chair job description, and reviewed a new chapter, "Pandemic and Epidemic Illness" in the *UUFM Emergency Preparedness Guide* [note that the World Health Organization has issued a warning of pandemic swine flu recently]. Other safety issues included better greeter training and the scheduling of Sunday post-service awareness emergency awareness sessions for members in late summer and fall. Future agendas will include reviews of issues raised in the *UUFM Annual Review 2009* conducted by the Committee on Ministry, namely, leadership development, improved communications, mission/vision/covenant, et al.

The new member and friend welcome dinner on June 15 featured good food and conversation. It was noted that some would like to see more community social programming. A review of our activities, plus those commitments by individuals throughout the community, indicate that we are deeply involved. I will note that the review of "Breakthrough Congregations 2008" indicates a very

large commitment to community social programming. However, consideration of congregation size, financial capability, and community are factors in a congregation's capacity to take on more projects.

This will be an active year. We hope that you like the new team approach being used by Membership for Sunday hospitality; also, teams managing the Happy Kitchen Fridays are underway. Other committees are moving ahead with plans. Especially, the Social Committee has already mapped out an ambitious program that will be of interest to all. Long-Range Planning will be conducting a new survey of member needs using focus groups. Committee chairs should meet and prepare to report at the first Council of Committees meeting.


