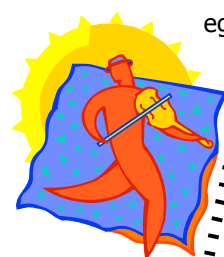

Every year the General Assembly for the Unitarian Universalist Association of congregations travels from one district to another. The Prairie Star District, of which our Fellowship is a member congregation, is hosting it this year in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The introvert side of me, half of me according to some standardized psychological test I took when I entered the ministry more than 25 years ago,



wants to stay home. This side barely survives the tsunami impact of the building waves of new people, old friends, workshops, receptions, worship services ... As much as I try to schedule myself wisely the extrovert side of me gets caught up in riding the high waves of energy that pulse through our national conference.

While deliberating on whether to attend or not, I asked Thea Nietfeld, whose advice I often seek and heed, what she thought I should do. After returning from researching the UU archives at Harvard, she listened to me share how much I learned about the history of Unitarian and Universalist attempts to form congregations in 19th century Kansas and how much there was left to find, she said, "You're sabbatical worked." She observed that I was not only rejuvenated but fired up. She was right. My enthusiasm to know more about how to empower our congregation, [and other] emerging and small UU congregations has never been stronger.

She said, "Go to GA." "Why?" I asked. She said, "You have a mission. Seek people who share your vision of helping emerging and small congregations to bring progressive religion into areas where they are needed." Aha! My fear of being worn down to a grain of sand receded as I sensed a way to navigate my way through the tremendous power of our yearly national gathering.

I plan to meet with a number of ministers and staff of PSD, other districts and the UUA to see what we can do to facilitate the creation and gathering of more resources for emerging and small congregations. Since well more than half of our congregations have under 150 members, this effort could provide a considerable boost to progressive missionary efforts across the country.

Having counted over 50 Universalist and at a least a dozen Unitarian attempts to bring progressive religion and culture

to 19th century Kansas communities, it is obvious that many efforts did not succeed. Imagine how different Kansas would be today if there were 62 thriving UU congregations scattered across the prairie? What has happened to all this potential? How many lives would this evolving religion focused on working to bring the right for women to vote, public education to all kids regardless of economic status, care to the mentally ill, the right and need to question dogma ... have helped and more often than we know, saved? That potential, like our history, waits to be revealed.

May we release the power to do this for ourselves and others!

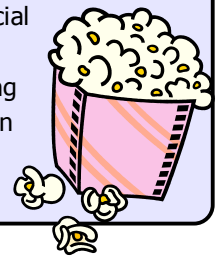
ANNUAL RE SOCIAL

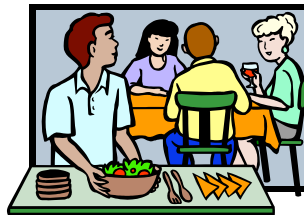

HELPING HANDS SUNDAY

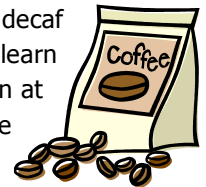
