Wow! What a difference between how I feel after completing the first and second lists. I should have started with the second one, because now there is a pain in my back, a heaviness in my heart, I don't feel like moving ... When I finished the first I felt the possibilities of spring in my bones, a lightness, an eagerness, ready for what comes ...

What we focus on makes a difference in our individual and shared lives. If we focus on what we can't do, what has gone wrong, the losses, forward energy sinks into inertia. When we focus on what brings a smile, cheer, warmth, goodness, then the feeling that we can do more rises. This is not to imply that the practical, a hard look at reality is worthless, but it does suggest that if one does not turn toward what brings joy and a sense of fun it is very difficult to move forward.

Optimism does not come naturally to most people, but it is a skill that one can develop. It enables one to refine the way they use their energy and resources that create more possibilities for success. Becoming proficient at being positive, expert at enjoying, fine at having fun, expands the capacity to be fully in the world. It is much easier to face the problems and challenges of life with a supple and reliable capacity for joy. Progressive faith fails if everything is reduced to limitations. Confidence in what is possible generates hope and increases the chances for good things to happen. Experiences of sadness, loss and failure provide opportunities for wisdom to root but to make them a dwelling place is to ensure despair. It is what we make out of our suffering that counts. Liberal religion asks us to find meaning in whatever happens and to position ourselves towards the bright side of hope.

MUSIC IN MOTION FIELD TRIPS

Music is a magical part of our morning service and the children enjoy the music as much as anyone. Unfortunately the kids don't get to enjoy *all* of the music. Personally, I'm in favor of excusing students to their classrooms as we do now because full participation in the RE program is important to me. But I would also like the kids to be exposed to more music, wouldn't you?

So I thought I'd "be the good" and give something a go ... a new UURE adventure--Music in Motion field trips.

The music department at K-State holds numerous free recitals throughout the school year on campus in All Faiths Chapel. Most are student recitals, some are faculty recitals, all are worth the price. I will provide door-to-door transportation and accompany the children. Parents and other adults are, of course, encouraged to join us, but it is not a requirement. To attend without a parent your child must be able to sit quietly (not necessarily silently) for at least 30 minutes. Most programs are about an hour long so if 30 minutes is your child's limit, we can enjoy the music from the foyer. If desired, after the music we can gather at my home (which is nearby) for a beverage and discussion.

OPEN DISCUSSION ON ENDOWMENT

Following the Sunday service on **APRIL 7**, please join us to discuss investing the Kirmser gift. This fall UUFM was blessed to receive a gift of \$126,000 from the estates of Phillip and Jeune Kirmser. The Kirmsers were founding members of UUFM and strong financial supporters even when their health prevented them from attending. It has been the practice of UUFM to engage in socially responsible investing, putting our money into funds that reflect our UU values. Our endowment funds are currently invested in the PAX World Fund. Before investing the Kirmser gift the Board and the Finance Committee would like to hear from the Fellowship regarding what values we should try to uphold with future investments. One option the Board and Financial Committee would like to pursue is to have a small portion of our endowment working to help local causes by investing with the Greater Manhattan Community Foundation. While it is unlikely we'll agree 100% on what "socially responsible" means and what values are most important for us to uphold, it is important for us to have conversations about our individual opinions and what common goals we have for the Fellowship. COMMENTS ON PROPOSED FY 2013/2014 BUDGET

The proposed budget was developed with input from committee chairs, the Finance Committee and the Board. There were some small increases for some of the areas. These increases were based on both expenditures this year and expected increases during the next year. We also added a new line item to cover the costs of our stewardship campaign as we go forward. Next year the Topeka UU Fellowship will host the annual Prairie Star District meeting. We have been asked to assist with that event and have included a small amount of money to cover any potential expenses.

The payroll has increased slightly due to minimal increases for our staff. In January this year everyone experienced a 2% increase in withholding due to the Social Security tax being restored to its former level. Last year the budget included funds for a half time Director of Religious Education. As you know we were unable to find a qualified candidate. This spring Sandy Nelson was hired at quarter time to help coordinate RE activities. We choose to leave the DRE compensation line at the original budgeted amount for 20 hr/week in hopes that we will be able to find a qualified candidate. The hire lag that we experienced is part of what helped keep us in the black this year.

The budget for facilities was increased only slightly but we are aware that in the next few years we will be facing some large, long-term expenses such as replacing the roof on the original part of the building. We will need to continue building our "building contingency" fund. Although we are putting \$1000/year into that account we have also had to dip into it such as when we replaced one of the air conditioning condensers last June.

Our income is largely from pledges. During this calendar year \$103,643 was pledged. As of the end of February approximately 75% of the pledged funds had been contributed. Our thanks to everyone for fulfilling their pledges. For our pledge income to cover the same percentage of our income in the next year we will need to have approximately 10% increase in pledge income. At the same time we have increased the expected income from fund raising from \$4000 to \$6000. This increased income is expected to come from your participation in the grocery coupon program. This program has grown and been a very successful. Your purchases at Dillons are generating approximately \$300/month. This is a win-win for all of us and we encourage you to continue to support this program.
