FALL CLASSES FORMING

PRE-K is for 3 or 4 year olds. Sandy Nelson leads this group in the Mercury Room, next to the Nursery to allow for easy transitions. Following the premise that children learn best through direct experience, the *Chalice Children* curriculum nurtures spiritual growth, creativity, and connection to our UU community through imaginative activities. We’re introduced to the UU chalice, explore the forces of nature, and consider making choices and overcoming difficulties.

KINDERGARTEN-2ND GRADE students meet in the Jupiter Room. Kathleen Oldfather leads students with the curriculum *Picture Book Unitarian Universalism*, by Kate Tweedie Covey. Similar to *Picture Book World Religions*, the curriculum uses a variety of children’s books to teach about the love, reason, tolerance, and good works that make up our faith.

3RD-6TH GRADE students meet in the Alsop Room with Matt Sayre. The curriculum, *Toolbox of Faith*, invites students to reflect on the qualities of our UU faith, such as integrity, courage, and love, as tools they can use in living their lives and building their own faith. Tools are used as metaphors for important qualities of our faith such as reflection (a mirror), flexibility (duct tape), and justice (a flashlight). Reflecting on the qualities (tools) of our faith, children gain insight into what makes our faith important in their lives, and how they can grow in our faith.

7TH-9TH GRADE students meet in the Neptune Room. Molly McGaughey will guide students through questions central to the spiritual journey of early adolescence including the *Spirit of Adventure* curriculum, including biographies of UUs who exemplify the seven principles. The group will explore self, beliefs, UU faith, and one’s relationship to others and the world. Discussions encourage exploration of beliefs about life, death, the divine, and the nature of humanity, supporting adolescents in thinking independently and acquiring an understanding of UU faith and theology.

All children must be registered for the 2014-2015 school year. Registration forms are available on the RE bulletin board, at the end of the hallway.
