

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE

A PEOPLE OF RENEWAL? (from *Soul Matters*, adapted for UUUFM)

September is a season of homecoming for us UUs. And renewal is central to that. At the opening of each new church year, we renew our commitments to each other and our church community. We renew our energy for another year of journeying together.

It's also a time of renewing our renewal questions. Yes, that sounds odd, but it's essential to understanding the importance of this month, and the importance of our faith. You see, one of the less noticed roles of religion is its sneaky way of changing our lives by asking us to change the questions we ask. This is especially true when we talk about renewal.

In our culture and secular lives, the questions we ask about renewal focus mainly on health (Are you drinking enough water? Are you getting enough sleep?) and work/life balance (Are you making enough time for family, play and rest?). Those are fine questions, but they don't take us very deep or push us very far. They don't enable the kind of transformation that religion wants for us.

And so along comes religion and it says, "Hey, look over here. There's a box with an entirely different set of renewal questions that nobody's opened yet." Questions like:

Are you sure it's your body that's tired, or could it be your soul?

What if "time away" isn't about *restoring ourselves* in order to return to our work, but instead about making space to decide if it's time to *reconfigure ourselves* and re-imagine what our true "work" is?

Is it time to renew your responsibility to those who will come after you?

Is it time to renew your commitment to carry on the work of those who came before us?

What if you saw your daily living and loving as an opportunity (even a calling) to renew others' faith in humanity?

Could it be that continual self-improvement is not the path to renewal but instead compassionate acceptance of who you already are, warts and all?

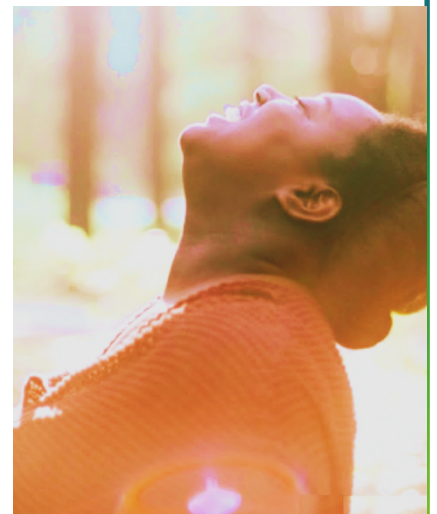
What if renewing our common future isn't just about moving forward, but instead requires a return to an honest telling of the past?

And that's just the questions that are sitting on top of the pile!

So friends, this month let's dig in together.

Let's renew and refresh the renewal questions we ask.

Did you have a chance for renewal this summer?

I did. My partner Jane and I took a camping vacation and though some of my behavior may have been riskier than what I had gotten used to, I kept my mask on when around others and stayed outdoors almost always. I spent a lot of time hiking in the mountains and staring at rivers. The time in a realm of reality--trees, dirt, rocks--helped heal some of the holes that have gaped in my virtual reality. I discovered beauty I had never seen and revisited favorite spots and routines.

As I returned to Manhattan and our constructed virtual world of Zoom meetings and limited in-person interactions, along with increasing numbers of COVID cases, I'm deeply aware of the things I miss. I miss hanging out at Radina's or Public Hall, riding my bike to meet someone somewhere, casual interactions that happen before and after planned meetings, running into people I know. I miss standing in the narthex before and after services and receiving handshakes, hugs



and snatches of conversation. I miss singing with other people, the sound soaking in so much that I cannot distinguish my own voice from those around me. On those rare occasions I do see someone in person who I have not been with in a while, as we meet

and greet from a distance outside, I miss the hug that would usually be there. An elbow bump is no substitute. I miss getting out of the house regularly.

A colleague recently named that we are going through collective trauma. And while some of us may be doing just fine, many feel on the verge of falling apart much of the time.

The effects of our pandemic time may last for years, especially as we look at impact on the economy, on children's education, and our ways of social interaction. In such a time, what could renewal mean for us, as individuals, and as a not-so-gathered congregation?

Might renewal mean rest to soothe our weary souls?

Might renewal mean recommitment to what is more important in our lives?

Might renewal mean finding the source that sustains us so that we can maintain through this time with integrity, balance, and grace?

Renewal could be a vehicle for us to remember our purpose--individually and collectively--and to reaffirm that commitment. In this time in-between, when so much is uncertain, may we find ourselves certain once again (or for the first time!) of what matters most.

CHALICE CIRCLES ARE FORMING!

Would you like to explore our monthly themes more deeply? Would you like to get to know a small group of UU's more closely? Perhaps, you'd like to explore our themes through a lens of racial justice.

Chalice Circles give an opportunity to grow in both intimacy and ultimacy, connecting with individual people so you know them and are known by them, and connecting with what is most ultimate, most holy in your own life. Chalice Circles are small groups (up to 8 or 9 people) who meet together, at this point via Zoom, once a month, exploring the same themes that we are highlighting during worship. There's a packet that everyone is given that they engage with on their own prior to the meeting (as much or as little as they feel moved--we certainly understand that everyone has lives and limited time to devote!). Included are spiritual exercises and questions that we talk about, listening deeply to one another's experience.

We have three existing Chalice Circles that explore the themes in general. We are also adding a group that will explore the themes through a racial justice lens. Groups will begin again during September and meet at different times the 3rd or 4th week of the month.

The two most exciting things that have happened are discovering two meat dishes that had been left in the oven and a millipede invasion. We just could not figure out where the smell was coming from until Charlie, my dog, homed in. The millipedes are harmless and seem to have been getting in the building through the two cleaning drains in the floor of the bathrooms. These are now covered.

We thank Troy who, after many years, has decided to stop doing our janitorial work. This means we will be changing to a professional service. BOARD APPROVES LIMITED BUILDING USE

Dear Fellowship,

I know this is a tumultuous time we find ourselves in, with new norms being created and just as quickly, being changed. While we will continue to hold services virtually, at its heart, UUFM is a community, and we want to make sure our community still has the benefits of our space when required. As a result, the Board approved limited use of the UUFM building for groups no larger than 10 people for a maximum time block of 90 minutes. All scheduling must be done with Sue (office@uufm.net) prior to building use, and multiple groups cannot use UUFM simultaneously. We are contracting with a new cleaning service for deeper cleanings, but each group that reserves the building will be expected to practice social distancing, wipe down surfaces after use, and take on any risk associated with building use. Anyone with a history of travel outside of the state less than 14 days prior, or that currently has any symptoms of illness will not be allowed in. This compromise is intended to make sure we all feel like we still have a spiritual home. I hope everyone is staying safe during this crazy period.
