

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A PEOPLE OF **STILLNESS?** (from Soul Matters, adapted for UUFM)

Don't tell me to be calm
when there are so many reasons
to be angry ...
I didn't say to be calm, said the wind,
I said to breathe.
We're going to need a lot of air
to make this hurricane together.

Often when stillness weaves its way into our discussions, it's framed as a retreat strategy. A balm from the frantic and frequently wounding world. But as wise ones like Rev Unger remind us, that's not quite right. It's less like a locked room that keeps all the enemies out and more like an oxygen mask that brings us back to life, that fills us with power. Stillness doesn't simply slow our breath and energy; it fills us with it.

As Unger suggests, we don't really want to be told to be calm these days. There is indeed so much to be angry about. So much that needs defended, resisted and restored. Which means that there's a lot at stake in how we talk and think about stillness. A stillness that invites us simply to escape the world is dangerous. A stillness that merely anesthetizes our nerves comforts us but widens the wounds of the world. To listen deeply to our troubled times is to hear a call to challenge the view that stillness is the resting place at the bottom of the hill we've climbed and instead imagine it as the base-camp that launches us into the long trek up the mountain.

And alongside this vision of stillness enabling us to gather strength also sits the equally important idea of stillness as something that clarifies our perception.


One of the most powerful and heart-breaking examples of this comes from the movie Schindler's List. In what is possibly its most famous scene, Oscar Schindler is sitting still upon his horse at the top of a hill looking down at atrocities being committed by the Nazi soldiers. Up until that moment, Schindler couldn't see past his rationalizations. But in that still moment, which was filmed in black and white, we watch through his eyes and see one small burst of red emerging from the sea of gray. It's a single small girl in a bright red coat. In that moment his perception is transformed and the stillness allows him to notice that which calls him back to his humanity.

So friends, stillness does this too. It allows us to perceive that which is truly precious. And in doing so, it calls us back to our humanity.

When we pause and find that sacred point of balance, that which is precious in life lights up as if in neon. The blur that usually dominates our attention fades to gray and we are able to notice that which truly deserves our focus. Our care. Our commitment. Our love.

And when we are surrounded by and connected to those precious things, a type of magic happens. We suddenly know ourselves anew. We suddenly feel at home in ourselves and the world. That sense of home can calm us or it may challenge us, but either way life comes alive again.

So home, maybe that is the true aim of this month. Maybe stillness is not an end but a means. Maybe it is not the destination but the road. The road that leads us home.

We had a warm-up with Thanksgiving, setting aside family gatherings, or limiting them, or risking them with a combination of testing and quarantining and whatever other accommodations you figured out.

These shifts and changes in how we celebrate have various effects. One of those effects is that we make so many more decisions that we are exhausted. Nothing is taken for granted or assumed, so everything becomes a decision. Also, a potential point of tension--or contention!--with other members of our extended families. So, the usual layers of holiday complications can become even more thorny.

Often this time of year I encourage people to identify as a family what are the two or three most important traditions or practices for them and to let go of the rest of it. "You don't have to do it all," I regularly advise. This year, identifying those key practices may be more important. At the same time, it may be more heart-breaking--if those things that we find most meaningful are the very ones we cannot do this year.

This is a year where letting go of *all* the old expectations may actually be easier than ever before. Rather than encounter one thing after another that is frustrating and difficult when you discover that you can't do, choose instead to let it all go and start from scratch.



So, this year, I'm going to challenge you to do something different.
Start something entirely new. This year, come up with a practice, something you can do with family or friends, that is new (and, of course, doable during a pandemic).

Maybe it's taking a long walk on Christmas Day. Or adopting the Icelandic tradition of Jólabókaflód, giving books on Christmas Eve and spending the evening reading (www.readitforward.com/essay/article/jolabokaflod-meet-favorite-new-holiday-tradition/). Maybe it's making a wreath by hand or voting as a family for a charity to support.

There is so much this year that we have lost out on. Perhaps that's the time we need to find something new and different

to sustain ourselves. One of the ways we build resilience is to allow ourselves creativity to approach things in fresh ways. Here's your chance to practice.

May your holidays--whichever you celebrate in whatever manner--bring you joy, peace and hope.




FROM OUR DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

JOIN A CHALICE CIRCLE!

Would you like to explore our monthly themes more deeply? Would you like to get to know a small group of UU's more closely? Perhaps, you'd like to explore our themes through a lens of racial justice.

Chalice Circles give an opportunity to grow in both intimacy and ultimacy, connecting with individual people so you know them and are known by them, and connecting with what is most ultimate, most holy in your own life. Chalice Circles are small groups (up to 8 or 9 people) who meet together, at this point via Zoom, once a month, exploring the same themes that we are highlighting during worship. There's a packet that everyone is given that they engage with on their own prior to the meeting (we understand that everyone has lives and limited time to devote!). The Annual Christmas/Holiday Sale will be held online this year. The sale will utilize a Facebook buy/sell group that has been set up specifically for this purpose. If you do not have Facebook, please see below for more information.

View the sale at facebook.com/groups/uufmchristmas. Once on that page, just click the Join Group link. Most people will automatically be accepted into the group, but some may not meet the "auto-join" criteria and will have to be manually accepted.

Items can be posted starting Tuesday, December 1, but will be hidden until the sale starts. The sale opens at 7 pm, Friday, DECEMBER 4, and closes at 5 pm, Sunday, DECEMBER 13.

Rules for posting are simple and can be found under Announcements on the Facebook page. All these steps are required. Listings not meeting these requirements will be returned to the author for correction and resubmission.

- Create one listing per item. For example, if you're selling 5 batches of cookies, you'll create 5 listings.
- Include the following in the description:
 - Anything necessary to explain the item you are selling that may not be apparent in the photograph.
 - 2) If it is food, include any allergy-causing ingredients.
 - 3) Pickup and/or delivery process. If you're flexible, include that in your description.
- If this is an auction listing (see below), very clearly indicate it as such.
- Take a photo or photos of the item and include them in the listing.
- Make sure you enter a price. If 0 is entered, it is assumed this is a freewill donation of the item. If it is an auction (see below), enter the minimum price.

We are also going to attempt to have auctions on the page. Buy/sell groups are not set up for auctions, but we'll give it a whirl. For items that are auctions, clearly identify them as such, then bidders will post comments with their bids. Highest bid wins!

The transfer of items from seller to buyer will need to be coordinated between the two parties. UUFM will not be able to house any items and cannot be involved in this transfer.

Since Rev Jonalu is retiring in August of 2021, we are in search of a minister. In an effort to be fully transparent with our congregation, and on behalf of the Ministerial Search Committee, I would like to apprise you of some changes.

First and foremost, the type of search for a minister has changed. Originally, we were in search for a three-quarter time "settled" minister. Note that Rev Jonalu voluntarily reduced her full-time position to three-quarter time this past year. From the Annual Meeting minutes, April 26, 2020: "Settled ministry is different from any ministry we've had before. Jonalu is a developmental minister and previous ministers have been contract ministers. Settled ministry is a long-term commitment between congregation and minister and therefore is a more involved process." At that meeting we voted to invest around \$15,000 in the ministerial candidate. This would cover travel expenses and hosting the candidate for a week of getting to know them, and them being introduced to the congregation and the Manhattan area.

Enter coronavirus pandemic. Full disclosure: I have not been my best, and I have struggled. I reached out to the UUA Transitions Program Manager Christine Purcell, for help with our settled ministry search. She said we are not the only ones struggling; half of the almost 50 congregations have dropped out of settled search. The good news is, Christine made the recommendation that we apply for a "contract-to-call" minister (a short-term contract with the option to call). I discussed this with the Ministerial Search Committee, and invited Christine to a Zoom Q&A with the Board.

With support from the UUA, Ministerial Search Committee, and Board, moving forward with a "contract-to-call" search makes the most sense during these uncertain times. Currently, a ministerial candidate will not be able to travel and stay a week to get to know us, and us them. Instead, getting acquainted will occur virtually. While this would save us a large expense, it does not seem fair to anyone in this situation to commit to a long-term settled minister position. Our hope is that a contract-to-call minister will love our congregation, and Manhattan, as much as we do, and over a couple of years the feeling will be mutual and we can call the minister to stay longer.

Who are your Ministerial Search Committee members? I, Jessica Sievers, am your chair. It is my honor to work with Molly McGaughey, Susan Rensing, Scott Tanona, Larry Weaver, Marisa Larson, and to have Lily Colburn for an alternate. This committee was chosen from nominations provided by Fellowship members and/or Board-appointed to round out the representation of the committee. The committee was unanimously approved by the congregation at the Annual April meeting.

The committee's goal is to uphold the best interest of our beloved congregation. Look for more updates in the future. In the meantime, please do not hesitate to contact me if you have questions about this process. I may be reached at 785 532-8471 or sieversj@qmail.com.
