JO'S REFLECTIONS - JO MASEBERG-TOMLINSON, JULY 20, 2008

Thank you Fellowship member Jo Maseberg-Tomlinson, for sharing these thoughts while Rev Michael Nelson is away on study leave!

When I was a girl, the end of July would find me in the kitchen of the old ranch house, the home Great Grandpa built from chicken wire, stucco, and lake mud, canning green beans.

It's been eleven years now since my family left the ranch, and as I read Barbara Kingsolver's book *Animal, Vegetable, Miracle,* those hot summer days of long labor came back to me. I remember the old radio playing country music as the canning went late into the night. June bugs clung noisily to the kitchen window screens, the windows wide open, begging for a breeze. Just seven more quarts of beans to can and then we could all fall exhausted into our beds and try to sleep despite the heat.

We children learned to snap and wash the bountiful buckets of beans at an early age, and as young women in towns and cities learned to paint their toenails and curl their hair, I learned to stand over a steaming pressure cooker, turning the knob on that battered stove to just the right number to keep the pressure at 12 pounds, no more no less, and to wait for the miracle of preservation to take place. I handled steaming jars and boiling water as my contemporaries handled change and scoops of ice cream in summer jobs that paid in something other than produce. And yet, I still recall the swell of pride that came with the first canner-load I canned myself. Those jars of beans, lined up perfectly straight on the wooden shelves in the cellar, seemed to promise more than just a balanced diet for some winter's night. They seemed to promise that no matter how lean the times would get-and times were always lean--we would have what mattered most: food and family togetherness.

Is it any wonder, looking back at the acre-large garden we raised and the produce we tucked away, that my first thought upon hearing that Jesus walked in a garden was wondering whether they raised zucchini in Judea? I may know better now, but I do believe that if the world shared a garden in the summer, we'd appreciate one another a great deal more. The brutal physical labor and the sense of satisfaction and accomplishment that comes from raising and preserving your own food create ties that bind those who do it. If our president had to tend his own garden to feed his family, we might be hearing about his prize tomatoes and not about his endless war.

I had that thought this past weekend as I attended a Methodist church in a small central Kansas town with my parents. As the congregation prayed aloud for rain, I remembered my childhood, praying for the rain to come and praying for the hail to stay away and praying for the plants to grow and become fruitful. I didn't hear anyone praying for our nation to best another nation in battle, or for our men to kill more of their men on a nameless street in another land.

Someday, I may have a child of my own. Before that day comes, I'd like to find a home with a garden plot out back, and somewhere nearby, a root cellar. There's something about bottling summer into the same Mason jars your great grandmother used that makes you realize who you are and what's really important in life. A child can do worse than to spend a summer working hard with family, putting by for another day. A child can do worse than to learn to pray for rain.

- Fast food Preferably purchased at a drive-up window from your vehicle. You may bring any item from the menu. Also bring the packaging that comes with it.
- 2. <u>Industrial organic</u> You may purchase this anywhere, but since meals 3 and 4 are from local foods, try to purchase ingredients that come from out-of-state, or from unknown origins. Items must be "certified organic."
- 3. Local and sustainable In this case, the food doesn't have to be "certified organic" but it must be grown locally (in Riley or nearby counties).
- 4. Food that you have personally grown, raised, hunted or fished. Perhaps you have an apple tree in your backyard, or some tomatoes in your garden?

A good source of local food is the Manhattan Farmers' Market, Saturday from 8 am to 1 pm, at 5th and Humboldt, and Wednesday from 4 to 7 pm, at Cico Park. THE VOICE OF THE PAST -

LITTLE HISTORIES

Dorothy Miller died January 1, 2000, almost 89. David Norton, a longtime UU friend and her caregiver in the last years of her life, came to the UU next day and announced her death. Most of the people there that day had not known her.

I met Dorothy in 1953 when I was a high school student. I probably had known her longer than anyone. She was my high school student English teacher. Yes, student--at 42, Dorothy Miller went back to college. In the 1950s, long before the age of the "non-traditional" student, that was quite unusual.

Dorothy was a little lady of great strength. In most ways she was a perfect example of a Unitarian Universalist, and she was an active member and builder of this Fellowship from its beginning in 1957 to the day of her death on that first day of the last year of our previous century. She, her husband Cecil and their four children—Lauren, Basia, Kerry and Tybel—were a bulwark of this Fellowship for close to half a century.

As a student teacher in training Dorothy graded one of my themes. I was a smart kid (weren't we all?) and I was used to getting A's from the regular teacher. Dorothy gave me a B. In the margin next to the word "obviously" that I'd used, she wrote, "If it's so obvious, why say it?"

Years later at the Fellowship I read a poem by Gerard Manley Hopkins and after the program Dorothy corrected my mispronunciation of the word "windhover." (Don't I have an excellent memory!)

Is it a characteristic of Unitarians to be critical? Yes, it is. We're that way from birth, perhaps. Critical thinking is part of our toolkit, but in the case of Dorothy it was far from the only tool. She was always exceptionally gracious, warm, and thoughtful. When I joined the Fellowship in 1983 she was quick to come up to me and renew old acquaintance with her bright smile and warm touch. I might add that graciousness and genuine warmth beneath the criticalness is also a characteristic--often--of Unitarians. We're pretty nice people. We just want to get things right.

But my point here, today, is not so much to write an encomium of Dorothy Miller as to remind all of you, especially those of you who are older than I--not too many of you anymore--that you may have stories about Dorothy or other members, some gone and some still here, that you harbor in your own memory

and, but for the tedious job of writing it up, might share with the rest of us.

History is made up of just such little stories. Glimpses. If you have one or more about your life in the Fellowship, why don't you call me and I'll be happy to listen to you and record it and write it up? Or just email the story to me and I'll make sure it becomes part of our historical record.

Oh, and sooner is better than later. Obviously.
