While in college, I had to stop walking by the laundromat



because of the abandoned adolescent cats that hung about. Hungry for affection and food, I'd either bring them home or feel guilty for not bringing them home. One child-hood summer morning, I found a blind, champagne hued cocker spaniel teetering down the alley. I

put him in the garage with a bowl of water, food and a blanket. My mother and Jane, a neighbor prone to dramatics, then decked out in a fancy white dress with black polka dots, had a lunch date. When they entered the garage, Jane screeched which propelled the old dog between Jane's legs. Her even louder scream sent him careening out of sight.

On a Sunday afternoon as Chuck and I walked our Tibetan terriers, Puja and Pushkin, on the country road outside of Centropolis, the first capitol of Kansas, I heard the unmistakable mewing of kittens. We discovered three six to eight week old kittens thrown off the bridge on the bank, soggy and frightened. We brought them home and they became farm cats. My father threatened to drown the kittens that my childhood cat, Topsy, bore litters of with clockwork regularity. I defended the rights of those kittens with all my childish might. I knew if I didn't find them homes, they would disappear. In the fir and birch woods surrounding our house in Sweden a family of wild cats lived. The first summer I put out leftover scrapes of meat and fat on a plate. This pleased them a great deal. The next summer I started buying them dry food. By the end of the third summer I was paying a friend to come by a couple times a week to refill their bowl during the nine months that I was in Kansas City. By the fourth summer I had named them, Caesar, Octavia, Nero ... When we sold the house in the sixth summer the real estate agent didn't think a clause which required the new owners to feed the cats was enforceable, or a good selling point.

Our cat, Maximum Kitty, or as Chuck sometimes likes to call him "Maxabillion," is a double rescue cat. Chuck's uncle, pre-Katrina, adopted him from a lady who devoted three of her houses in the French Quarter to saving abandoned and feral cats. When Chuck's uncle died, the cat was sentenced to the animal shelter where he'd be

euthanized. He was scrawny and missing half his fur. Now he's magnificently handsome and rules our house.

Many people, like stray cats and dogs, need the safety and nourishment of our Unitarian Universalist Fellowship. People who are rejected from or who do not fit in to their family because of their progressive politics, liberal religious perspectives, sexual orientation; people wary of telling others what they really believe or don't believe, because of the fear of being shunned by their primary community. Providing sanctuary is an ancient act of mercy and kindness. It often can be of great benefit to the provider. We can't imagine life without Maximum Kitty. His need to be loved (when he wants affection) reminds us of how love sometimes needs to be drawn from us. His fierce independent spirit routinely demands long petting sessions. The thrum of his warm contentment on my chest teaches me patience and to just allow the sweetness of this connection let me know my place in this world. We all need places in our life where affection is available and shared; where our independent natures receive respect.
