The largest skink I've seen lives under our cement porch.



Almost a foot long, it bathes in the sun on the stone pavers in front of the porch. Its scales gleam in a geometric pattern that bedazzles. It looks as well fed as the bunnies who favor my patch of Swiss chard. I'd never classify Skinky as plump. When necessary it moves

into its cave of safety in a blink of an eye. The cylindrical body holds the pent up energy of a torpedo. When it's just going about its business it's all slick and liquid ease. When I move too close it blasts into its dark cave.

Skinky is a member of the "cosmopolitan family of pleurodont lizards." Why they don't have sockets for their teeth in the inner surface of the alveolar ridge is beyond me. The skinks I've observed don't seem to have a wide interest in many parts of the world either. They barely tolerate me and I've never seen them hanging out together on a rock wall. They seem to be loners, unless they have a private social hall where their world rocks and insider trading occurs. I assume they don't have a complete aversion to each other, because small skinks also patiently wait for lunch to land close by.

I enjoy watching Skinky relax in the sun, but if I had the inclination, I'm not sure I'd choose these lizards to study seriously. The choices for sustained inquiry are vaster. I might choose the Ouachita map turtle. Their post orbital, oblong spot fascinates, as does its numerous yellow lines. But it may not be such a good choice for a closer and prolonged inspection since they are highly secretive and acutely sensitive to any disturbance. The damsel fly appeals, at least the Enallagama civile, who sometimes has a blue thorax. They are graceful and active over still waters. The diaphanous wing light reflected in a pool on a tributary of Mill Creek could be just what I need to be in fuller synch with summer rhythms; but the Kansas City house must be packed up and there's a contract pending on our West Spring Creek house. Arranging, coordinating, filling hundreds of boxes ... often feels like waves pounding ...

Soon we will be out of the Bermuda Triangle of houses. Our two-year renovation/addition project northeast of Alta Vista will be far enough along so that we can begin to live there. The mailbox will be about a half mile from the house. They can't move it closer because their rules require another mailbox be less than a mile away on that route. I'll be hoofing it down the lane across the iron and wooden planked bridge and the pool underneath where the big blue heron likes to fish. Sitting on the bridge with my feet dangling over the darting minnows and the bullheads centers me in the moment that flows into timelessness. Fireflies from this seat transport me into the mystery of the night, raccoon mischief and the haunting song of the chuck-wills-widow.

Being lulled from the linear demand of facts opens the round world of wholeness. Yes, we need to pay attention to reality in all of its parts, but we need enchantment and wonder to release us to a kinetic oneness where we can experience our true and unencumbered selves.

May we put the pieces together and be held in wonder.

A SPECIAL GIFT ...

In March, Fellowship Caring Committee co-chair Barbara Hacker asked our longtime friend Edith Hinrichs about the beautiful, intricately woven baskets we still use every Sunday morning for our collection. Beginning in the 1960's, Edith, her husband Carl (who is deeply missed following his passing in 2006), and their sons were active Fellowship members over four decades. Edith served as UUFM's Board Chair in 1980/1981, when we purchased and began holding services in the Oak Grove School building on Zeandale Road. She and Carl retired to a milder climate several years ago. Edith writes ...

I am delighted that [my baskets] have held up as well as they have, and that the Fellowship is still using them.

I began making pine needle baskets in the 1990's when Carl and I began "snow-birding" and camping down on the Gulf of Mexico in Gulf Shores, Alabama. I saw a few very old baskets at a museum in the area and decided that I would like to try making some with all the long leafed pines that we were surrounded by. I would rake up the needles on the ground under trees that caught my eye, about three huge trash bags full, then I would sit and sort the needles, the longest and most boring part of the procedure, keeping only the ones that were in the best of shape and the longest, usually winding up with perhaps less than a half bag's worth, rubber banded into neat piles. Then the fun could begin.

I bought a book on the various stitches and styles of pine needle basketry, and experimented with various kinds of materials to literally sew the rounds of pine needles into the coils that built up the basket shapes. I've used raffia, crochet thread, yarns and other materials, and finally decided that my favorite was artificial sinew, that looked like the raffia used in the old time baskets, but held up much better and was much stronger. I also began using slices of English walnuts, from the tree in our backyard in Manhattan that Carl would slice into rounds for me. I used those to begin a basket, and also to decorate my baskets as I built them.

As for gauges to keep the needles the same width, I use very high tech stuff. Plastic straws in various diameters, from fast food places. I have about three or four different sizes that I really like working with, cut into about one inch lengths that I stuff full of needles as I work around the basket.

I finally hit on some designs that I like and [use] often, as I start a basket. I have no idea how it is going to finish up. It just "happens." I like the challenge of making fairly large, sturdy baskets. Most that you find these days are pretty small and considering how long it takes to make even a small one, I can understand that. One basket that I made for a silent auction for the local no-kill animal shelter down here in Alabama was on display for a while at the Houston Natural History museum, so I guess I can call myself an "exhibited craft-person."

I wanted to do something for the Manhattan UU way back when David Grimm was minister and I asked him to choose from several baskets that I had, and those were the two he chose, so I guess y'all are stuck with them. Like I said before, I am so pleased that they have held up and that the Fellowship still enjoys using them.

What with moving down here to Fairhope, and working on this house, and dealing with life in general, I haven't made any baskets in a very long time and am thinking of starting back up again. I still have needles from several

years ago that Carl helped me gather and sort and I really should use them up.

A good soaking in very hot water for about 15 minutes and they are ready to go.

So ... include my regards to all my friends in the Fellowship that I truly do miss very much. Carl and I left a good part of our hearts up in Manhattan when we moved south ...
