

When the impulse to apply to Starr King for a Masters in Divinity clarified into a need to understand the origins of



creation I felt free from the constraints to have a plan that had a practical outcome. An amorphous desire transformed into a vision. The yearning to know how things come into being, everything from apples to kittens to the moon, has guided me as long as I can recall. At Starr King I

realized that a unified life, one that wasn't fractured into parts, drove me to examine the nature of time and love. I found that I preferred Kairos, timelessness, instead of Chronos, chronological ordering. One morning during a class in the fireplace room I sensed that everything was alive. The walls, floors, ceiling and windows were in motion. The living knowledge of revolving protons and electrons induced a powerful experience of unity; a way to balance chronos with eternity. In this place of unity, I learned how love could become universal. In our highly sexualized culture I saw how one's love could expand to encompass all life rather than just one person.

In these first five years with you, I saw the need to deepen and widen our progressive community. I helped facilitate a process which would hire and integrate a DRE into our lives, introduced the concept of a "Helping Hands Sunday," explored new ways of generating funds to expand and intensify our evolution, such as the Goods and Services auction, helped lift up the arts in the Fellowship and promote the evolution of guidelines for Conflict Resolution and Right Relations. None of these goals could have happened without the partnering with members and friends willing to experiment and see what might happen.

In a journal from three and a half years ago, I quoted David Hockney, "Love is the only serious subject." Love requires living wisdom, not some abstraction which has no way of holding one accountable. Wisdom requires knowledge which requires experience and the contemplation of that experience so that it may reveal its essences. Two and a half years ago, after breaking my ankle in a lightning storm, I read Thoreau's Walden carefully. In his conclusion Thoreau exhorts, "Be ... the Lewis and Clark of your own streams and oceans; explore your own higher latitudes ... be a Columbus to whole new continents and worlds within you ... It is not worth the while to go round the world to count the cats in Zanzibar ... explore thyself."

During my sabbatical I plan to do most of my exploring at Three Oaks, where Charles, Maximum Kitty and Freja, an abandoned, starving kitten who mewed her way into our lives, live. I want to research the Unitarian and Universalist Churches in Kansas that no longer exist with an eye toward what UUism in Kansas needs to expand into the future. I hope that the research provides insights to assist us in our vision for the qualitative and quantitative growth of our Fellowship. I will continue a writing project whose springboard is Thoreau's Walden. Charles and I are co-authoring a book called "A Gay Couples Guide to Walden." I/we will be reflecting on what it means to find the balance between simplicity and our increasingly complex world, between labor and leisure, creativity and repetitive daily tasks. This will take me into the work of David Grimm's beloved Emerson, who was a mentor to and benefactor of Thoreau. Between these two goals there is the call for renewal, meditation, and who knows what else, but in all this I will seek ways for compassion to teach me how to love life in every moment.

May love liberate us from the entrapment of tedium,

Write a check or volunteer your time to see that someone does not go hungry. You will feel good for having helped someone else, but think about how good the person feels with a full stomach. As Unitarian Universalists, helping those who are hungry or less fortunate is written into our character. Think locally, you can see the good that you do.


