UUFM 2010 ANNUAL MEETING

Our Annual Meeting will be held following the Sunday service on APRIL 25. Members are urged to take this opportunity to participate in the future of our Fellowship, as we discuss our plans and dreams for Fiscal Year 2010/2011, which runs from June 1, 2010 thru May 31, 2011. Please carefully review the information provided below, to familiarize yourself with the issues and items to be discussed and voted upon.

COMMENTS ON PROPOSED 2010/11 BUDGET

The FY [Fiscal Year] 2011 Budget has been assembled and is presented in a table for your consideration before the Annual Meeting. Remarkably, this budget is \$61 LOWER than the current year's! As planned, the Religious Education Director's salary is being transitioned into the operating budget. Therefore, in the upcoming fiscal year the amount of income from the Chalice Lighters grant plus the DRE special gifts is reduced to a total of \$8,000. As an expected consequence, the amount needed from pledging in the proposed 2011 budget is increased disproportionately by \$6,829 over last year's budget. However, with increase in membership, the total amount *needs* to be pledged by each member actually goes down compared to the present fiscal year. The current year Actual/Expected income from pledges is \$83,600, so we really need our pledge support to increase by about \$21,000 in actual pledges over last year in order to support the present budget. I expect this may give some pause, but consider that only about 85 of our FY 2010 members pledged (as 60 units) in the present year! This was offset substantially by unexpected nonpledge income, and an unprecedented year in fundraising (goods and services, etc). However, we should not rely on this additional fundraising in the upcoming (or any) fiscal year.

Summary of expenses: Overall, normal expenses have remained unchanged or have only increased slightly, but reductions include the removal of sabbatical expenses (-\$2,500), reduction of the building "contingency fund" (-\$1.000), and reduction of facilities (-\$1,970). Due to increases in the cost of health insurance, the Payroll part of the budget has been increased the most (+\$3,920).

Added expenditures in the Administration budget include support for bookkeeping, which has been previously handled by Kathleen Oldfather. This change includes the outsourcing of payroll management to a private firm, and changing to a web-based version of the bookkeeping software (Quickbooks Online). Overall this amounts to about a \$600 increase in expenses. Remaining bookkeeping duties will be shared between the treasurer and a volunteer bookkeeper.

Finally remember that this budget is a reflection of member input and should also be approved by member input. Please make it your responsibility to learn about the budget, and, if you vote to support this budget, please make a commitment to it with a pledge that reflects that support.
