Many routes lead to Unitarian Universalism. It can feel risky to go where you have never been; enter rooms filled with



strangers. For Peter Morales, the president of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), it was his 12-year-old daughter, Marcella, who wanted to belong to a Church. All of her friends belonged to one, so it was Marcella that brought the Morales family to a UU parking lot on a Sunday morning. Her parents were

reluctant to leave the car. They wanted to go back home, but honored their promise to their daughter, and walked in. This small risk eventually led Peter to the Starr King School for the Ministry, and to the presidency of the UUA. Thanks Marcella!

Peter's parents were Mexican immigrants. The first in his family to attend college, he received a full scholarship at Raymond College where he met his future wife, Phyllis. After graduation they moved to Lawrence, Kansas where Peter did graduate work in the administration of higher education. He received a Fulbright Scholarship to teach in Spain. In the midst of this adventure, their 4-year-old son, Miguel, was diagnosed with kidney cancer. The odds of his recovery were higher in the states. They moved to Berkeley where they helped Miguel endure 18 months of chemotherapy. With Miguel free of cancer, the family moved to Sacramento. Peter worked for the state and Phyllis taught school. They had their second child, Marcella. Life stabilized and then became boring. They cashed in their retirement plans and bought a small newspaper in Roque, Oregon. The newspaper became a community ministry. As a team they created a socially conscious agenda. The paper was a strong proponent of gay rights at a time when others in Oregon were actively working at passing anti-gay measures.

The Morales found a home in the Eugene UU congregation and as they moved further into the life of this progressive faith community, Peter felt the call to become a UU minister. Again the family changed course and Peter became a student at Starr King. This September he attended the World Congress for International Freedom in India where he spoke on the need to move beyond conflict to reconciliation. The Dali Lama spoke about the intersection of science and religion and the need for religion to evolve as science provides new insights.

Peter, a liberal religious evangelist, urges congregations to increase their capacity to reach people who would, like his family, find themselves at home in a UU community. One of the beloved UU traditions Peter questions is the practice of "Joys and Concerns." In small congregations of 50 members or less, the sharing of joys and concerns during services fosters a sense of connection and community; however, as congregations grow, the practice can become lengthy and cumbersome, break-

ing up the smooth flow of the message of the service. He understands the profound importance for people to share their joys and concerns. He believes that UU congregations need to find multiple ways for them to be shared. In the spirit of experimentation the program committee and I, feel that we would benefit from experimenting with new approaches to the way we share our joys and concerns. Our Committee on Ministry suggests that we develop a phone tree to share information of an urgent nature. We encourage your feedback and suggestions as we experiment with a variety of ways to share joys and concerns. Let us know what you think works and doesn't work. Let us be willing to explore and evolve so that we continue to make our Fellowship a place where they are cared for with compassion and joy.



A week later Michael asked us "How can we respond to evil yet neither succumb to hate nor lose the capacity to see good in people?" Michael's talk gave no easy answer but again provoked a lot of response from the congregation. One comment I treasure was that "We need to be stirred [to decent action] but not shaken [in our commitment to humane values]." I've skipped the martini but used the phrase as a helpful mantra in several situations since then.

And then the Musicale! August at the Fellowship was an inspiration ...

... and then came September: new faces in the adults, lots of new children in RE, some terrific programs and more wonderful music. And there is a lot of not-soobvious activity: we have many active committees that do good work among our own members and in the local community. This ranges from book clubs and discussion groups among ourselves to serving breakfast to folks who need it and delivering commodities to people who are unable to collect them for themselves. This good work is rewarding in itself and can always use more hands. If you are new, volunteer. If you are already active, welcome new people and new ideas. The year is off to a fine start. Take part!


