Moore was the first Episcopalian Bishop to begin to promote the



ordination of lesbian and gay clergy. For the Episcopal Church the issue of LGBT presence in their ministry continues to provoke serious controversy. Unitarian Universalism, less hierarchical in its structure, has a propensity, at its best, to move into places of chaos so that a new order may evolve. In a study of the history

of religion in Kansas it is noted that while UUs might be small in numbers, their impact for good far exceeds their smallness. A scan of 19th century UU history demonstrates how much UU's did to help the disenfranchised and those who could not help themselves. Clear vision and leadership helped provide opportunities for all children to get an education regardless of their social standing, encouraged humane treatment of the mentally ill, developed public parks ... organized for human rights, envisioning and creating structures that melded the lofty and practical goals. UU's were on the vanguard of LBTQ rights and we still stand on the side of love ...

Last week while researching Unitarian and Universalist history of early Kansas, I discovered that Manhattan, Kansas, had a Unitarian Society in 1903. This moment of research bliss came unexpectedly while following a questionable trail. This opens a new frontier of investigation. The number of UU attempts to establish a progressive religious presence in Kansas in the first 40 years of its statehood approaches eighty.

The executive director of the Massachusetts Bay of UU's, Rev Cooley, studies why congregations grow. "Congregations that establish a good balance between 'I,' 'we,' and a 'larger vision' are the ones that grow. 'I' honors the individual, 'we' deals with how we stay connected in the face of challenges and conflicts, and the 'larger vision' addresses the ministries that the congregation is dedicated to, issues that are larger than the congregation itself." Rev Cooley asked, "How does each of the groups within the congregation serve the larger mission? Who are you in your community? ... I have worked with congregations that spent enormous amounts of time and energy polling their congregation but they never once looked at the surrounding communities ... What does that say? It says, 'it's all about us."

Progressive religious culture celebrates diversity by urging us to reveal the resonating connection between our inner selves and the cosmos. In this multi-dimensional process, which can be quite confusing, we begin to recognize our true relation with all

that lives. Honoring the connections brings us to a place of vulnerability--a sacred place where we are willing to be helped, when we need help, and to help when help is needed. As our sense of interconnectedness intensifies, we understand how we are called as individuals and as a progressive religious community into a vision of inclusion that helps us to save lives in the here and now.

May we live out the promise our UU forbearers brought to this state.

REFLECTIONS - MARIA SNYDER, DRE, OCTOBER 28, 2010

October has been an exciting and busy month in RE. This year



we are focusing on world religion. The K-2 students take a break from this to study OWL (Our Whole Lives). I have always thought that the children are the future and what we teach them will shape the future. I am coming to a new understanding of not only what we are teaching our children,

but now I am drawing parallels to what that might translate to in the real world. Watching how our children are growing spiritually has made me excited for the future and proud to be a Unitarian Universalist.

Teaching world religion not only teaches the children about individual religions, but can also teach our children to celebrate diversity and to appreciate and respect the ideas and beliefs of other people. To truly understand anything one needs to participate in it, and this curriculum lets us learn about the philosophies and participate in the celebrations of religions. We will study Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism, among others. Breaking down some of the stereotypes and misunderstandings about religions will help our children be leaders for peace and justice.

Teaching children about human sexuality will let them be comfortable and confident in themselves. They will make educated decisions about their own sexual health and that of their future partners. They will have a real understanding of what sex is and what it is not. A healthy sexual self is part of a whole, healthy, and happy person.

During Popcorn Theology, I have noticed that the teen group is very interested in social justice issues, their own roles in the world, and how they can be more than complicit bystanders, but how they can make change. The tools we have given them up to this point have helped them become empathetic world thinkers. We are empowering the next generation to heal the world.

2010 GUEST AT YOUR TABLE CAMPAIGN


