Janus holds the number 365 in his hand. As the gatekeeper of



time this Roman God's power spanned the mundane and cosmic. The juxtaposition of the infinite in the hands of the finite puts one in the orbit of the earth round the sun. As I gladly pay for my late fees at the public library I do not feel the magnetism of the sun pulling me with bil-

lions of others in a tilting cycle of time that marks our passage through life.

It amazes me how easily the vastness of our existence collapses into taking care of business. Some days feel like it's just one duty after another. Janus marks transitions. Something ends as something begins. Change, constant change is the way of life. This can be unnerving as kids grow up so fast, and you find yourself much older than you thought possible, especially as the people who held you as a baby die or died long ago.

Janus opens the doorway to the contrast between the every-day and the galactic. I recently read about one of those people who did something revolutionarily fabulous at a young age. He just turned 40 and a reporter asked him, 'How does it feel to be that old?'" (Of course, I'm thinking, that's young!) He shared that he didn't feel older. He feels ageless when he lives in a way that is relevant. My interpretation: relevant equals kinetic meaning--you live in the reality of this moment, stretching between the finite and the infinite.

Being centered in every moment feels impossible, but when I am living from core, I do not feel the weight of my age, the bygone days, lost opportunities all the things that anchor one to the past, and can yank the spirit down. At 101, Dorothea Tanning, calls herself the oldest emerging poet. Most known as a surrealist painter, married to Max Ernst, in 2004 she published her first book of poems, "A Table of Content" and has just published her second, "Coming to That." In between painting and writing she also tried her hand at sculpting. Obsessed by the universe, she can't stop exploring. She doesn't dread mortality, or simply accept or defy it; she lives in this here and this now, often dwelling on the big picture of life. This dreamer/philosopher artist does not live in a rarified world. Long post office lines make her impatient. Dorothea's advice: "Keep your eye on the inner world and keep away from ads, idiots and movie stars." Paying attention to what brings life into vital focus helps one balance all life's tensions, no matter what age we are. If we don't burn our experience through the fire of our own thought, as Ralph Waldo Emerson, the Unitarian poet, dreamer, essayist suggests, we are just a jumble of experiences with minimal transformative value and creative power.

Don't be afraid of mixing things up. Play keeps time flexing and can bring wonder and discovery to every age. "Many people find joy in actually doing something the pragmatist would call useless." Let us be inspired by Dorothea Tanning in this New Year. Joy is always useful, especially In January.

REGARDING RE - CORY ZELLER, DRE, NOVEMBER 22, 2012

Happy New Year! We sure are happy in the RE program. 2011 was a great year--we learned about World Religions, traveled the world with expert tour guides, studied the Seven Principles, engaged in social action projects, and celebrated the holidays. We also partied hard at Parents' Nights Out and Family Fun events. 2012 promises to be an awesome year too. This year we'll study the Judeo-Christian roots of Unitarian Universalism, learn more about our religion and Fellowship through the Chalice Children curriculum, and grow through a variety of activities and games. Our K-2nd and 3rd-6th graders will take Our Whole Lives classes to gain knowledge about their bodies and respect for themselves. We will also continue Parents' Night Outs and Family Fun events in addition to participating in Fellowship-wide events like the upcoming Chili Tasting.

In January, the K-2nd and 3rd-6th graders start a new curriculum on the Judeo-Christian roots of Unitarian Universalism. Each week they will explore a Bible story through the lens of Unitarian Universalism, learning the characters, plotlines, and morals. Our hope is that these lessons will give our children the tools to speak intelligently about the Bible and the confidence to engage in discussion about it with their peers. The preschoolers continue their *Chalice Children* curriculum, studying the Unitarian Universalist religion and the joys of being a part of our Fellowship. The infants and toddlers will continue to explore new themes each week with accompanying activities and stories.

Also, starting this month, we will have *Our Whole Lives* class meetings on Sundays from 1-2 pm. If you have a K-2nd or 4th-6th grader who would be interested in taking this class, please plan on attending the *mandatory Family Orientation* meeting on January 7, from 1-4 pm, and all eight class meetings from January 8-February 26. OWL is a wonderful curriculum and promises to be an exceptional learning experience for our kids.

Our monthly Parents' Night Out will be Friday, January 6, from 6:30-9:30 pm at the Fellowship. The theme is resolutions and promises. Our Family Fun event this month is the Chili Tasting on Saturday, January 14. We will have kidspecific activities while enjoying a variety of yummy chilies.

Finally, the spirit of giving in the RE program will not stop just because the holidays are over. In the month of January we will work with the Social Action committee to advertise and ignite involvement and enthusiasm for the Souper Sunday food collection for the Bread Basket. Look out for our posters and growing pyramid of cans!

NOTABLE JANUARY EVENTS IN UNITARIAN UNIVERSALISM

- January 20, 1566 Frances David (Ferenc Dávid) offers the first Unitarian oration in the church of Kolosvar, Transylvania.
- January 6, 1568 *Diet of Torda*, Transylvania. Debate between Unitarian Francis David and Calvinist Péter Melius Juhász led to recognition of Unitarian Church in Transylvania.
- January 13, 1568 Edict of Torda, Transylvania. Influenced by the preaching of Francis David, Prince John Sigismund (János Zsigmond Zápolya) issues an edict of religious liberty, declaring official toleration of "other" religions.
- January 28, 1568 *Edict of Tolerance*, Transylvania. Prince John Sigismund issues final Edict covering all religious sects.
- January 14, 1571 *Edict of Maros*, Transylvania. Legal recognition of equality of Unitarianism with Catholicism, Lutheranism, and Calvinism.

TIMELINE OF UNITARIAN AND UNIVERSALIST HISTORY

We begin this month with events in the spiritual roots of our traditions. We will continue with monthly segments in this, and future newsletters, as space allows. The timeline was developed by Gregory Giacobe, of the First Unitarian Church of Essex County, New Jersey.

- 14th Century BCE Pharaoh Akhenaton establishes the cult of Aton, the Sun Disc, in Egypt. The earliest recorded instance devotion to one, unified godhead.
- 8th to 4th Century BCE Commentaries on the *Rig Veda* and the *Upanishads* claim all religions are true and therefore worthy of toleration and respect. This begins a current in Hinduism that lasts to the present. Ananda Marga, a recent branch of Hinduism, teaches that energy and matter are evolved from cosmic consciousness. Thus, all created beings are of one universal family.
- 6th Century BCE Hebrew prophets increasingly expound the idea that the God of Abraham is the only true God.
- 6th to 2nd Century BCE Jewish compilers and commentators of the Torah and Talmud develop the idea of the "Righteous Gentile," based on the "Noahide Code," a binding set of laws for all humankind.
- ca 300 BCE Zeno of Citium, founder of the Stoic school of philosophy, teaches a principle of universal restoration of humankind with nature and gods, "apokatastasis."
