Their roots swirl in



and out of the bank in a massive tangle. They create a city of crevices and knobs, which hold the colossal trunks that rise high into the sky. The crown shimmers a red-singed silver just before the sun sets. From their low reach to their tippity-top they beguile. In mist or snowfall they float.

Walking as Poppy raced along the creek I noticed a lump of bone and fur. Ah, an owl pellet. Wrapped in-

side the fur was the cracked skull of a pack rat. I looked up into the oaks and hackberries for a nest but couldn't see one. As I approached one of the four Queens, who reign over this section of the creek, I saw a mound of twigs in a lofty hollow. This red-tailed hawk nest might have been pilfered by a barred owl. These big owls don't bother constructing their own. Its current resident might also be a great horned owl. Barred owls argue over power and territorial rights. Their battle cries crisscross the meadow with a pitched fierceness that sends a chill up the spine. On summer nights the barred owl, big horned owl and the screech owl mix their voices with the crickets. In February the big horned and the barred owls, who mate for life, lay two to three eggs. The nests of barred owls are often found in the cavities of trees so I imagine it is a pair of big horned owls who have claimed this nest in this sycamore notch. The pellet suggests a big owl.

Pack rats are cute. They don't have the menacing visage of a city rat, but don't be fooled; they'll chew through a truck's brake line in a heartbeat. Leaving a car outdoors invites mayhem. Mice scurry to build nests in the engine, chew off wires and pack rats will line their homes with car parts.

People wonder if we get bored in our little valley of the Flint Hills. Of course we do, but it is also very good not to have 1001 distractions pecking at our souls. Yes, there still is the TV and its satellite dish, the internet, books, the phone, and we can always get in the car or truck and take off if 5 foot snow drifts don't block our exit. Last summer we enjoyed the rich cultural offerings of Montreal and New York City. We feasted on art, five course dinners and pizza. We sometimes mused about what it would be like to live in a progressive, multi-cultural, artistic wonderland. Temptations nudged. Some of the stone houses in this area have sycamore wood for baseboards, ledges and trim. Most of the handhewn beams in the barn we replaced this summer were sycamore. They must have come from the creek. I love how the stone walls in our kitchen speak a language 300,000 years old as I sauté poblano peppers from the garden, bringing the fire of summer into a winter dish. The water we drink fell as rain and snow on our tin roof held in a 1700-gallon tank in the garage. Our lives are intimately linked to the earth under our feet, the sky above, the wind that moves through the bluestem and the fire in our stove. The bountiful stimulus of NYC rivets me in time. The towering beauty of a sycamore extends me into timelessness and it's here I know myself best in the scheme of things.
