Anyone looking for the holy land might best begin with the earth that sustains us ... Rev Forrest Church, UU Minister

The holy holds you in stillness, calms all the mental chatter, the anxieties and fears that press. It focuses the power,



mystery and beauty of the universe. It connects you brilliantly to the interdependent web of all existence. If for only a moment you have no questions or answers. The infinite unification of the cosmos dissolves separation. You are at home. Approaching this state becomes easier when the hills and woods slip from winter duff to the green of new life, when the turkeys call and

the creek sings after a long silence. Yesterday evening Chuck and I sat up by the old smoke house and watched the last of the sun sink beneath the swelling buds of the oaks. In the presence of this tranquility enervation seeps out as I hear the myriad birds and the new calves calling to their mothers, smell the fecundity of the warming earth and bite into asparagus fresh from the garden.

Recently Bill Moyers interviewed Sandra Steingraber, Ph.D., ecologist, author, cancer survivor and authority on environmental links to human health. Married to an artist and the parent of two children she dedicates her life to finding the holy balance between those things she loves and that which threatens its health. She doesn't hang out in a doomsday world. As a scientist she understands that the reality of global warming is worse than predicted, yet she chooses love to guide her as she gives herself to the joys of being a mother and an environmental activist willing to go to jail for acts of civil disobedience.

Steingraber knows the tension of how love can spill over into frustration, when she asks a New York congressman to release public health reports on fracking in the Finger Lakes area of New York where she lives. He just turns and walks away from her. She has sent him dozens of requests for the public health impact statement on fracking and storing the gas. She has gotten no response. He refuses to engage in an honest conversation on the subject at a public hearing. She begins to yell at him, "Why, why, why won't you release this study?" He won't answer.

Weeks later she links arms with a number of protestors to prevent the progress of the Kansas City based company hired to assist in the fracking work. Instead of paying the \$385 fine she resists any complicity by going to jail for 15 days. Her second day in jail is Earth Day. She celebrates it by writing a letter to the world. Check it out.

I love this woman, her passion and the courage to do what her conscience requires so that she can balance her moral duty to her family, public and ecological wellbeing of the earth. It's not enough for me to just sit on the high ground of the Flint Hills and revel in its wonders. Atrazine one of the most widely used herbicides in the U.S. is banned in the European Union. Approximately 75 percent of our stream water and about 40 percent of all groundwater samples from agricultural areas tested in an extensive U.S. Geological Survey study contained atrazine. The U.S. EPA's inadequate monitoring systems and weak regulations compound the problem, allowing levels of atrazine in watersheds and drinking water to rise to extremely high concentrations. It is being sprayed a couple miles from me as I write this.

Asking questions and getting true answers about the use of herbicides and pesticides that are linked to cancer, miscarriages, and increased health risks to the newly born as well as the old must be a democratic right, a holy right. But it means nothing if we don't participate in the democratic process of protecting what we find holy. What can we do as religious liberals to help create the holy balance between reverence and action? How can we collectively be more responsible stewards of the Northern Flint Hills, the Kaw Valleys and its bodies of water that we rely on for our existence?

OUR UU IDENTITY

Our children have spent the past year exploring UU identity through the seven principles of Unitarian Universalism.

In September they began with principle one – *Each Person is Worthwhile.* This was a recurring theme throughout the year.

October covered principle two – *Be Kind in All You Do*. Sundays were filled with stories, art projects, discussions, and friendship.

November – three – *We Help Each Other Learn*. We learned how each of us touches the lives of many and children had lots of opportunity to mentor each other.

December was our service project month. The first was for the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee and children collected money all month to donate to UUSC. The other project was a homegrown literacy initiative. Children's books were collected all month then bundled into cloth satchels to deliver around town to places such as the Emergency Shelter and the Crisis Center.

January – principle four – *Search for what is True*. There were discussions about Martin Luther King, Jr., the difference between being a leader and being bossy, plus relating leadership skills to the world around us. The youngest kids discovered that always telling the truth can be pretty difficult. Especially when it means telling someone you care about something they might not want to hear.

February – number five – *All People have a Say*. This was a popular month. There were spirited discussions about voting, rules, interfering with rules, and two lively debates – one about whether Jack (of beanstalk fame) was a thief, the other about whether or not to have snacks after the morning service.

March – six – *Work for a Peaceful World*. Discussions focused on both personal peace and world peace. Snow was also prominent in March!

April – seven – *The Web of Life's the Way*. The Earth is a special place – something to worship, nurture, and take care of.

IN MAY our students close the school year by putting all the principles together and using their explorations to connect to others – both within the UU community and the greater Manhattan community. On **MAY 12** Molly McGaughey will lead the adult program with the help of ALL our children – from our newest babies to our graduating seniors. You won't want to miss it.


HELPING HANDS SUNDAY

FROM OUR CHAIR - SCOTT TANONA

Thank you to everyone who has taken part of the "voicing our values, shaping our future" stewardship campaign so far. I hope you have found valuable the chance to sit down with another member and share what you think matters for our fellowship. I have been excited to learn more about the varied ways we come to UUFM and about how important the fellowship is and what a difference it has made in so many of our lives. We are a community of like-minded people in many ways, but we are also different, and I hear again and again how both of those are critical to the kind of community we have. I really sense the strengths of our connections when I hear stories of how we come to understand each other better when we learn the ways we don't all agree, and when I learn how people who might not have otherwise met each other feel such strong bonds of community.

We will culminate the "voicing our values" stewardship discussions with a visioning workshop on June 8. Everyone who wants to have a say in the direction of the fellowship should try to attend, and we should each continue to discuss with as many others as possible our own values and our own vision for the future of the fellowship. We need to be clear about what values we want our actions to speak to in the coming years. We need an explicit conception of the future state of the fellowship, what it will be doing, who it will serve, how it will be perceived, and what it will stand for. This requires more than thinking about our facilities or any other concrete feature of our fellowship, and is more about what we do with those features and which of the things we do is most important. The fellowship has accomplished significant goals to get to where it is. If we want to further develop as a community, we need to set ourselves a new vision of ourselves as we are not (yet), and take steps to move toward that vision.
