

I've been thinking about privilege. Anna, my cousin, who works in Chicago's inner city school system, said that over two thousand teachers and aides were fired this year. As a specialist, her job, funded by a grant, was on the chopping



block. She just learned that her principal found the money to keep her; a valued teacher devoted to the welfare of the African-American kids she serves.

A few years ago she applied for a job at a prestigious private school on the north

side, which provided better pay and benefits. She was tempted, not by the money, but the relief from despair. She's lost count of the number of kids she's loved who've been killed. It was clear that their new hire would be well qualified; whether it was her or another teacher, it wouldn't make much difference to the kids. The elitism implicit in the hiring process was distasteful. When she said no to their job offer, the principal couldn't believe that Anna chose to stay in the ghetto.

As Chuck rose through the ranks of the criminal defense system I grew tired of hearing about how new laws made it increasingly difficult for people of color to get a fair trial. Profiling by police was and is a major problem. When the red lights flashed on I-70 he would check to see the person's color; it was often a person of color and if it was, often the trunk was open and a search for drugs was in process. I became sensitized to prejudicial behavior and now, I too, always look.

The Trayvon Martin case sets the problem of race in full view. When President Obama shared how it felt to see women clutch their purses and hear that click of locks on cars as he walked by--that he could have been Trayvon--I felt furious and sad.

While in a master's poetry class at the New York Summer Writer's Institute taught by Frank Bidart, I met a black man enrolled in a nonfiction workshop. A senior in college with a triple major in philosophy, gender and African-American

studies, he's bright and driven. He's applying to ten graduate schools. When I realized that none of the writers, which included Ann Beattie, Robert Pinsky, Phillip Lopate, Joyce Carol Oates, Jorie Graham, were African-American, I asked him how he felt about that. He said he's used to it.

Isn't the fact that we tacitly accept the assumptions of privilege a prime cause of racial inequality? Feeling helpless and in despair over cruel inequities doesn't help. It will not save one of the 12-14 kids shot dead in Chicago each week. What will? What can we do to make a difference? Having Obama as our president certainly helps. We also need to elect people who share our progressive values. What else?

I hope that collectively we can make a difference, there is that.

#### **UUFM** AND THE FLINT HILLS GI RIGHTS HOTLINE - ANNE COWAN

Our Social Action Committee and the Manhattan Alliance for Peace and Justice, heard about the national GI Rights Network (GIRN) in 2007 when a workshop was held in Oklahoma City, training counselors to work with this program. We heard about this too late to attend. Not knowing anything about the GIRN, we called to see what it was about. Before that phone call was over, plans were being made to have such a workshop in Manhattan. A few of us started planning, putting the logistics on volunteers at UUFM. On February 2-3, 2008, UUFM hosted three nationally recognized GI Rights counselors (two lawyers and one lay counselor) who presented massive material to 25 interested people. There were lawyers, social workers, peace activists and just plain curious. Attendees came from Wichita, Topeka, Salina and Oklahoma City.

UUFM took care of set-up, provided lunch, kept the coffee pots and water pitches full and of course cleaned up. The event was a huge success. As a result of the workshop, several attendees expressed interest in becoming GI Rights counselors and intensive training began. This was a steep learning curve and very time consuming as we met every week to study military regulation and counseling approaches. Some spent time on the phone listening to experienced counselors take calls. We ended up with four lay counselors--two Mennonites from Topeka and Manhattan, a retired advisor from K-State, and me (a UU).

The Flint Hills GI Rights Hotline was created including fliers, website, phone system, some education and a lot of nervousness as we started taking calls from soldiers and their families in September of 2008. Since then UUFM has been a steady supporter. We added one new counselor and are training another. We have long time support from the Salina UU Fellowship, the Manhattan Alliance for Peace and Justice, Manhattan Friends Meeting, the Southern Hills Mennonite Church of Topeka, the Manhattan Mennonite Church, The Sisters of St Joseph of Concordia, and UUFM. Four of us take turns handling calls five days a week 11 am to 7 pm.

Happy summer to all! We are past our second month in the 2013-2014 UUFM year and I am happy to report that things are going great at UUFM; we are on the move for a fantastic year! I want to share a little bit about the important work some of our key committees have started so far.

**FACILITIES** The facilities committee deals with everything about our building and grounds that require regular maintenance, repair, upgrades and planning for the future. Co-chairs



are Matt Campbell and Mark
Mayfield; loyal member Tom
Manney continues to lend his
expertise. Matt came to our
July Board meeting and reported on some pressing physical plant needs that will be
addressed in the very near
future and others that will be

studied and acted on later in the year. Mark put out a call for new members to join the Facilities committee and he told me there was a good response. If you notice something broken, or really like something that is working right, let your Facilities committee know about it!

**PROGRAM** This committee touches the lives of every UU in our congregation because they do all the planning and organizing for every Sunday service throughout the year. The Program Committee is co-chaired by Amber and Drew Vennum with members Dick Beeman, Dave Lambert and others. These folks have come up with a topic for every Sunday or group of Sundays, and they have speakers for nearly all of them. An example of a theme series is what began on July 14, with the first in series on expanding our understanding of word religions. Amber interviewed a friend and colleague who is a member of the LDS Church. I am sure that Sunday programs this year will be particularly interesting and stimulating as we explore many topics.

**Music** A Sunday service at UUFM would not feel complete to many without good music. Michael Oldfather chairs the Music Committee and is assisted by several talented members. We are so fortunate to have Slawomir Dobrzanski, piano faculty at K-State and world-renowned performer, as our pianist and accompanist to the choir. We are additionally fortunate to have the very able Renea Hawley as a second pianist to fill in Sundays that Slawomir is not playing. Michael directs our UU Singers; all are invited to join. Let us know if there is a special kind of music you like to hear, as there are no rules requiring that we always have hymns and other "church music." Please feel free to chime in ...

**RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (RE)** The RE program continues to be a mainstay for many young families at UU and the activities of

the children are the highlights of the UU experience for many of us. RE includes infants and toddlers through young teen and early middle school age children. Topics in RE are usually fun for the children and sometimes challenge them to think about their place in the world. A recent program was a "tour of sound" in which different physical objects like pipes, wood and bottles were studied for the sounds they can make. That sounds really cool! Breaking news from our RE staff is that Sandy Nelson is no longer the Interim DRE. She is now the DRE of record (no "interim" label) following her concurrence with unanimous action by the Board and the RE Committee. We are so fortunate to have Sandy Nelson as our DRE and also to have an excellent core of adult volunteers to serve a fun group of children.

Getting involved with service at UUFM is so important to the life of our Fellowship. Other committees needing members or input are Aesthetics, Caring Committee, Ministry, Communications, Finance, Green Sanctuary and Happy Kitchen. Get involved! Some say that service is good for your spiritual growth. Serving others can result in serving yourself to have a better life.
