In a recent interview with the film star Greta Gerwig, who grew up in the Sacramento UU Church, she said, "I think I keep returning to a UU Church again and again because it resonates with something deep inside of me that feels that all I really know is that I don't know ... (it is) the best place for me to experience the fullness of the sentiment of not knowing." As a human being, a writer, a minister, a gardener I become increasingly aware of the power of not knowing.

At the New York Writer's Institute this summer a number of highly acclaimed writers who work in various genres spoke about how important it was for them, as they write, to not know what happens next. The real juice often comes from characters that do something unexpected or a slant that brings a perspective to their work they never imagined; approaches that shift their understanding of what they are trying to do. This "not knowing" brings life to their creation. Of course at some point you do know, but a mistake many writers make is to overwork passages. This often extracts the juice. Yet, it is also true that this magic, the passage of grace, can open as you delve deeply into the process of revision. When something doesn't feel quite right, authentic, fresh, you move into it from as many angles as possible until its inner coherence, logic and beauty reveal themselves.

The garden at Three Oaks is in its fourth season. The basic



design is in place. The foundation plantings provide a structure from which all kinds of surprises emerge. This year the old fashioned Nicotiana Alta, (related to the tobacco plant), has stationed itself in an intersec-

tion of the garden I'd never have guessed would create such wonder. I certainly wouldn't have chosen that spot. Its profligate nature casts seeds in all kinds of places. The triangle of five six-foot plants with trumpets of white blooms releases a mesmerizing scent at twilight when the hawk moths love to dive deep into its blossoming center. The white flowers glow in the dusk.

It surprises me that Charles and I are making plans to get married in California in November. What's even more surprising is that we are deliberating about how to elevate the issue of marriage equality in Kansas so that it is not another progressive value that's sidelined. This civil rights issue deserves a place in our public discourse. Lambda Legal, a national organization, which often works with the ACLU to file lawsuits for marriage equality told me this week that Kansas was a state that they would not consider offering legal counsel to on this issue. Kansas is in the tier of states they categorize as hopeless.

I do not feel hopeless. Do you? Will you help us to advance the progressive ideals of equality for all people? Can we become the beacon of hope that brings strength and optimism to the people who lament the erosion of human rights in this beautiful state? I don't know what's possible, but I dearly would like to find out. I am willing to bet there are many sweet surprises that will pop up if we liberal Kansans work and dream together. Let us find out what's possible when we do not have second-class citizens.

Our RE program is fabulous because of your gift of time.

As we head into the fall, we begin our World Religions curriculum.

The **K-2ND GRADE** class uses *Picture Book World Religions* by Kate Tweedie. The goal of this curriculum is to introduce world religions through stories and allow young children to explore the differences and similarities to their own lives. There are beautiful picture books that introduce young children to Hinduism, Islam and Buddhism in a gentle and respectful way. These books teach about world religions by telling a story. The stories illustrate concepts such as the value of wisdom and loyalty in Hinduism, the importance of family in Islam, and the practice of compassion for all living beings in Buddhism.

The **3RD-6TH GRADE** class will use *A World of New Friends: An Introduction to World Religions* by Sara Sautter as a jumping off point. The lessons in this curriculum are designed to use a child's curiosity flavored with stories, art, drama, and song to introduce participants to the many truths and many faiths that richly color our earth and enrich our lives. Students will have an opportunity to meet a number of individuals who have different faith practices as the curriculum is supplemented by a variety of guest speakers representing other faiths within the Manhattan community.

The **7TH-9TH GRADE** class will use *Neighboring Faiths: Exploring World Religions* by Christine Reed and Patricia Hoertdoerfer. The curriculum acquaints students with a diversity of faiths. Teachers talk with students about the foundations of such faiths, as well as take the class on field trips to neighboring places of worship. The group may modify and augment units to explore the religions practiced within Manhattan and to encompass the specific interests of the students. There is focus on values including:

appreciation of religious cultures; interest in, and acceptance of, diversity; and pride in one's own religious faith(s). Parents are encouraged to participate in the outings to places of worship. This is a wonderful opportunity for every family to experience a Neighboring Faith exploration.

In the **Nursery**, infants and toddlers continue minilessons with new themes each week. There's also plenty of exploratory play time.

The **PRESCHOOL** class will use the curriculum *Chalice Children* by Kate Tweedie. Based on the premise that children learn best through experience, this program helps nurture spiritual growth, creativity, and a sense of community through imaginative activities and rituals such as rhymes and finger plays.



INTO ACTION! ... I get this sense that UUFM is on a roll! The summer is winding down, people are returning from summer travel and school and other activities are getting of the ground for the fall season. We have our vision statement written and



now we need to define some objectives that fit within our vision and devise a plan of action to achieve those objectives.

This past week many of us were reminded of "The Dream" for a world of justice, love and

peace that was the vision of Dr Martin Luther King he articulated so piercingly 50 years ago in Washington, DC. UUFM now has a vision; it is a firm and conscious dream, to be "... A visible beacon of liberal religious messages of hope and meaning in our local community."

Our UUFM Board had a planning retreat recently in which we had a "brainstorming" session. We thought about and recorded as many good ideas generated by our congregation in June that were used to formulate our current vision statement. It was a lot of fun! The chalkboard and two sides of a marker board were *filled* with barely legible scribbling of wonderful ideas. We were ecstatic and intent about all of it! Realizing full well that UUFM cannot do everything it wants to do in the first one, two or three years following the emergence of our new vision statement, we settled on just two significant and highly engaging topics for action: **SOCIAL JUSTICE** and **ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP.**

When the Board's daylong session began that sunny Saturday morning we really had no idea how it would end. We went from *vision* to *action*, and that experience embodied the sentiment of "not knowing," referred to by Michael Nelson in his Musings this month [see pg 2]. The UUFM Board entered that classroom with a sentiment of not knowing, and we emerged with a direction that is so important for our transition with grace in UUFM. "Stay tuned"--come to Fellowship on Sundays, check the UUFM e-mails and blogs to learn what is happening, talk to other UUs, get yourself and your family involved in any one of our great committees or extra events--and you will learn what is happening as we move into action with our shared vision, and more will be revealed to all of us for the near and long-term future of our Fellowship.
