JONALU'S JOURNAL -- REV JONALU JOHNSTONE

I promised during the sermon on religious language a few weeks ago to investigate the word "sermon." I didn't like



what I found. Indeed, the negative connotations of the word have been built into the current dictionary definitions. Words like "reproof," "exhortation," and even "tedious" come up. Sermons, indeed, seem to be about making judgments and calling lis-

teners to account. That's not what I learned in my preaching class with now-retired UU minister Judy Hoehler. Nor is it my experience with well-developed sermons by the best preachers I have heard. (And, I know, "preaching" has many of the same disturbing connotations. Sigh.)

I have always used the word "sermon" in order to distinguish it from other kinds of talks: "lecture," which is primarily about conveying information; "discourse," which has a more philosophical feel; "oration," which is way too grand; "speech," which is what politicians give; "homily," which traditionally has been very short; and just plain "talk," which doesn't say much at all about what it is.

The question, it seems to me, is about what we intend to do in the time we spend together on Sunday mornings. For me, we are crafting an experience that we share as a gathered congregation that will invite us into deeper reflection on our values and on the meaning of our lives, as we strengthen and develop the bonds of community. Everything that is part of the service--the music, the readings, the story, the Joys and Sorrows, the offertory, the announcements, the people in the room, the aesthetic setting, everything--should work together to create that shared experience. The goal, then, of the words offered during that twenty to thirty minute chunk of time that I, or someone, is talking, is to contribute to the experience. So, how do we bring together values, meaning, and community through those words?

A couple of people have used the word "provocation" to describe what I have called a sermon. True, that time should provoke us to think more deeply about our lives--not in a way that says "do this, not that"--but in a way that invites examination, meditation, perhaps even change. But "provocation" doesn't seem to be exactly the right word, because there's more. This talk may also offer comfort, raise a new way of looking at something, remind us of an old way of looking at something; it may reinforce our thinking, or overturn it; it may fill us full of emotion or leave us longing for something that is missing.

For the time being, I have decided to use the word "reflection" for the talk I offer during the service. I like that reflection can mean thoughtful consideration on a topic, and also that its other meanings imply a relationship between surfaces and light that provide a metaphor for how such a talk works in a congregation. When my reflections are at their best, they will reflect, or bounce back to you, what I am hearing in the congregation, but perhaps through a different lens. At any rate, I hope my words--whatever they are calledare helpful in discerning meaning, examining values, and strengthening community.

WORDS FROM OUR CHAIR -- KATIE KINGERY-PAGE

Dear Fellow UUs and Friends,

A lasting gift I have received from this fellowship was the chance to attend a week at UUA MidWest Leadership School last summer. This gift was given by farsighted members who joined together some years ago to establish a lay leadership fund. During the Leadership School week, we each filled out a postcard to ourselves, a note to remind of us of what we learned or experienced. My postcard arrived a few days ago. On it, I had written, "whose are you?"

Not "who are you" (heck, I can easily answer that), but "whose are you?"--a spiritual question intended to bring a person deeper into true service and purpose. My best answers to this question take me closer to my motivation for leadership at UUFM. I think we make a difference in people's lives, and I think we have more "difference" to make.

As Rev Johnstone hosts a reading group this month on <u>Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption</u>, she opens an opportunity for us to examine issues of race, criminal justice inequity, bias, and institutionalized discrimination. In her role as our leader, Rev Johnstone has become active with the Coalition for Equal Justice (CEJ), an interfaith and community group that's asking our community to end racial bias in traffic stops and marijuana arrests. The CEJ is asking Manhattan/Riley County to *care* that African American people are 4 times more likely than white people to be arrested in our community on marijuana charges, despite national data that use of the substance is equal in among both demographics ...To *care* that these arrests can devastate lives, affect employment, and disrupt families.

And so I ask: Whose are you? Perhaps you are moved to serve at UUFM because you love teaching our children, because the work of caring for others lifts you up, or because you enjoy keeping our facility and grounds beautiful. Perhaps you feel a calling to work for positive change in our community. Perhaps you'd like to network with other UUs across the Midwest, to take a stand on social justice issues.

"Whose" are you? There are many ways, great and small, that you can be part of UUFM, whether to build our internal community, or to shine our light in the broader community. We currently need a Communications Committee chair; if you may be that special person, or if you'd like to serve UUFM in another way, please contact me, chair-elect Matt Campbell, or Rev Johnstone.
