Peace on Earth. Goodwill to all.

That's what the story says the angel proclaimed. This sea-



son, peace on earth grows ever more elusive. As I write, the Paris attacks and Beirut bombing have not yet faded from our awareness. Who knows what will have happened before you read these words? The immediate response to the events in

Paris was increased bombing of Syria by the French. Meanwhile, shouts rang out for our own country to take a stronger stance against the Islamic State.

At the same time, many of our leaders, including our own governor, have reacted against the most vulnerable, calling for the exclusive of Syrian refugees from our country. It's not the first time that anti-immigrant sentiment has arisen, of course. We Americans have long been cautious about immigrants who were seen as "not like us,"--Asian, African, Hispanic, even Jewish refugees before World War II. But how ironic, that as we celebrate the poor wandering couple who found no place at the inn, that we would push others away.

Religions across time and place have called for peace. In ancient times, the prophet Jeremiah decried people who said "Peace, peace" when there is no peace. The prophet Jesus was supposed to be the Prince of Peace. There are peace Buddhas and peace gods.

At the same time, religions have been at the center of conflict through the ages. Conquest flowered with the conspiracy between states and religious leaders not only in Christianity and Islam, but in Buddhism and Hinduism as well. From the Crusades to the Islamic State, people have used religious ideology to declare their own cultural superiority and to crush those different from themselves.

So, how do we present an alternative view? As religion has inspired war, so it can inspire peace. I've come to believe that we need to take seriously even suggestions that seem outlandish and impossible. We must because what else is there to do but build an alternative worldview?

What if we were to add a Department of Peace to our federal institutions of Department of Defense (which could be renamed the Department of War) and Homeland Security? What if we took peacekeeping and peace making as seriously as making war? What if we learned and taught nonviolent compassionate communication and peaceful resolution of

conflict on the small scale--in schools, in religious institutions, in community organizations like Scouts?

Maybe this season of Christmas could be a time of peace seeking and peace making, a time to remember the high price of conflict and to find a new way.

Let there be peace on earth. And let it begin with me.

FINANCIAL UPDATE FROM OUR TREASURER

Thank you for your ongoing support and generosity. In October our expenses exceeded our income just slightly for the year, by \$818. Income for the month was \$14,648 and expenses were \$16,604. The Pancake Breakfast yielded \$353 and the Kroger's grocery dividend was \$523. We have increased our financial support of the Happy Kitchen free breakfast program from \$30 to \$70 a month. We also supported the Epp Lecture and Roots of Justice program. If you are not participating in the Kroger's (Dillons) program, you should be. It's the easiest fundraiser we have. WORDS FROM OUR CHAIR -- KATIE KINGERY-PAGE

As the traditional, Judeo-Christian season of gift-giving arrives this month, I have been in mind of people I met long ago, when as an 18-year old I visited and worked in Navajo-Hopi Land in the southwestern United States. I was visiting another traveler from Kansas, who told me I'd be welcome if I helped tend sheep and goats. I stayed with a generous family named Benally. I travelled across the US that summer, from Kansas to San Francisco. It was 1993. Aside from a brief stay of farm work, I had no income and survived off a meager savings, dumpster-diving, and the kindness of strangers.

I will not soon forget the generous Benally family. I'd written a school paper, months earlier, about families like the Benallys, who were then (and still are) resisting forced government relocation from their homelands on Black Mesa. A quest that was one part adventure, one part idealism, and one Volkswagon Vanagon set me on the highway that summer. I cannot imagine that my herding assistance was of much value, being as I barely knew one end of the sheep from the other. And yet the Benallys did not hesitate to share food and shelter with me. It was my first intercultural experience and it marked me in many ways. I left with my mind afire with the relativity of cultural values.

A few years later, I came across writings about the Dineh (the self-identified name of the Navajo). Writings similar to this, "A Gift Economy is one where status is given to individuals based on what they give to others as opposed to a commodity or exchange economy where status is given to those individuals who have the most." (Pinchot 1999 cited in learningtogive.org). Or this, from a 1994 Los Angeles Times article, "Among Indians [sic], possession is never perceived as a form of wealth--unless you can give it away." And even if the latter is a sweeping generalization, it helps me understand the many forms culture clash can take as capitalism meets other life-ways.

This fall and winter, UUFM participates in the national Unitarian Universalist Service Committee program, *Guest at Your Table*, which encourages our families to help those who are most in need. This year, *Guest at Your Table* is devoted to helping refugees worldwide. As described to me by UUFM's director of religious education, Sandy Nelson, something even more important than the money we gather in boxes or cans we set at our dining tables is our conscious reflection upon generosity--holding gratitude for our own comforts and being willing to share our wealth with others. Here is some of what's in the works.
