

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE **A COMMUNITY OF PRESENCE**?

Spiritually, presence can mean two radically different things. On the one hand, contemplatives talk of "being present." Presence from this perspective is all about awareness and remembering to "live in the moment," or "be mindful." Presence, in this sense, contrasts with mindlessness, a state where we rely on habit or stay reactive to anxiety. Mindlessness can fuel addiction, block authentic relationship, and leave us feeling empty. The alternative is bringing deliberate presence into our lives.

In the second spiritual meaning, theologians tend to come at presence from the perspective of "otherness." Their concern is not just that we pay attention to the present moment, but that we notice a transcendent Presence that is woven through all moments. What is this Presence? Some call it the Ground of Being, Spirit, or God. Others decline to give it a name, focusing on its mysterious nature and letting it be.

This month, we refuse to takes sides. Attentiveness or otherness? Who says we have to choose? Isn't it true that, more often than not, they dance together more than they compete? Isn't it true that when we are most present, a powerful Presence emerges? Pay attention to your child and slowly a confidence and unique self unfolds. Pay attention to the flow of your breathing or the flow of the ocean and something bigger than yourself enters the scene. Pay attention to a piece of art or immerse in a work of music, and it seems as if something is speaking. Look for a long time at a singular tree and eventually it presents itself to you as a world unto itself.

The underlying message here is that the world is full of unnoticed gifts and grace. It's a message perfectly fit for this month that so often celebrates presents over presence. In the face of commercials and billboards that tell us

our lives will finally be complete if we stuff them with a few more shiny objects or plastic gadgets, our spiritual traditions come along and remind us that our lives are already complete. Their message: The greatest gift of the holidays is noticing the many gifts that have been sitting there all along.

So how will you engage this dance? What powerful and meaningful presence is waiting for you to be present to it? What gift is waiting and wanting to emerge? What will your awareness bring into being this month?

JONALU'S JOURNAL -- REV JONALU JOHNSTONE

My favorite Christmas song is an obscure one--"I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day." Henry Wadsworth Longfellow wrote the words. The narrator tells of hearing the bells ringing on Christmas Day, repeating the refrain of "Peace on



Earth, Goodwill to All" (yes, yes, the original says "men," so I update the language). The narrator gets upset, seeing how the world makes a mockery of such wishes "for hate is strong."

Many of us identify with that narrator to this day.

Hate continues to be strong. Even as Confederate flags disappear from official places, racism has reasserted itself on-line and sneaked out of private places into the public realm. A two-tiered system of criminal justice allows black men to die and be incarcerated at stunning rates. Despite increasing acceptance of same-sex marriage, BGLTQ people-especially those who are transgender--encounter open hostility. At least 21 transgender people, many of them people of color, have been killed violently so far this year, according the Human Rights Campaign. The Southern Poverty Law Center reports 892 hate groups across the country, an uptick last year for the first time since 2011, near double the number of groups as they counted in 1999. In the wake of the election, haters seem emboldened. Swastikas have reappeared as graffiti, and hijab-wearing women have been confronted with threats. Yes, the words "Peace on Earth" are being mocked.

Longfellow, in the song, hears the bell peel again, louder and deeper, asserting that God is not dead, so "the wrong shall fail, the right prevail." While that speaks to me, I recognize that those who dismiss or struggle with the idea of such a God may not be encouraged. However, one need not embrace theism to trust a moral arc of the universe that bends towards justice. When Longfellow wrote the song in 1863, slavery had not yet been vanguished from this continent. Women were subservient to men legally and in practice in their daily lives. People who did not conform to expected roles of gender and sexual orientation were invisible. A Civil War raged, taking hundreds of thousands of lives, about 2 percent of the population. As bleak as it looks today in the battle of love versus hate, 1863 was far worse. Steven Pinker, whose book The Angels of Our Better Nature explores the incidence of violence through history, asserts that despite blips like the Syrian war and IS terrorism, we are far more safe than we have been in the past, and that that trend holds true across the world--less homicide, less war,

less genocide. If we look at the large scale, we are more peaceful.

The world keeps turning. You may or may not feel a presence that reassures you, but I hope in this season of striving towards peace and goodwill, you find encouragement and inspiration.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

UUFM will hold a congregational meeting on DECEMBER 18, following the Sunday service, to discuss and vote upon a resolution regarding ending the use of Native American mascots in our community schools. This issue is not new, but has been the focus of dedicated work by the ReImageMHK group and is currently under consideration by the School Board. Many UUFM members and Rev Johnstone have been active in the movement to change the mascot, which is currently an "Indian." In November, ReImage MHK approached Rev Jonalu Johnstone to ask if the Fellowship would publicly support chang-ing the MHS mascot. In accordance with our Bylaws, the congregation must first discuss and vote on whether UUFM should issue a public statement of support. The resolution to be considered:

The Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Manhattan (UUFM) stands with ReImageMHK to support removing Native American ("Indian") mascots from our community schools. UUFM feels the evidence that such mascots harm youth, including the documented fact that they lead our youth to hold over-simplified and erroneous ideas about present day native people, present a moral dilemma that can only be resolved by phasing out the use of Native American mascots in our community's schools. UUFM understands that this transition may take time, but nonetheless asserts that the decision must be made, now, to end the use of Native American mascots in our community schools.
