We end up living divided lives, so far removed from the truth we hold within that we cannot know the "integrity that comes from being what you are."

It's one thing for a religion to offer you an identity; it's quite another for a religion to celebrate your identity. At our best, we UUs seek both.

Our entire Soul Matters program is about UU identity. Each month, we lift up a unique value or human quality that our faith calls us to live and lean into. Together, our themes tell us who UUs uniquely are. But that's only half of the equation. In addition to "UU identity," there's also "your identity." And our faith communities are just as committed to that.

These days, identity has become charged in our larger society. As we work to break down sexism, racism, heterosexism, ableism and other systems of oppression and discrimination, we are called to examine our identities and how those identities intersect and play out with others in our world.

Unitarian Universalism and UUFM welcome your various identities. Don't hide yourself--we want your whole self, even in all its contradictions. We agree with Parker Palmer that our society has separated us from our souls. Indeed, the only relevant religions today are the ones that take this seriously. Hell certainly exists; it's the state of having to hide ourselves. And we also cheer on Walt Whitman's celebration of messiness and contradiction. We don't just want people to be honest about their contradictions; we want them to see those contradictions as great gifts! Bottom line: we want our congregations to be places where you don't have to pretend.

And it's not just the pressure to pretend that breaks our hearts. Our faith also worries about the way our culture urges us to live small. As social critic, Courtney Martin points out, "It's never been more asked of us to show up as only slices

of ourselves." The risk of this, of course, is that if we live too long only in our "slices," they become all that we are. There is no greater spiritual warning than one Kurt Vonnegut lifted up: "We are what we pretend to be, so we must be careful about what we pretend to be." Friends, this identity work isn't a game or merely a pastime. It's unquestionably life and death stuff.

And here's the kicker: our faith wants you to stop hiding and live fully, not just for *your* sake, but for *our* sake as well. We are all struggling to escape our slices and connect to our hidden wholeness. Seeing you be real gives us permission to be let our true self out of the dark! Your brave honesty about your contradictions, allows us to proudly strut around in our multitudes! We save each other by being true to ourselves.

So this month, maybe these signs need hung on your own personal doors: Hidden Parts Allowed Out in the Open! Contradictions Welcome! No More Pretending! For all of our sakes.

JONALU'S JOURNAL -- REV JONALU JOHNSTONE

Who are you? The simple answer is to respond with a name. Even that has complications--first name or last? Nickname? That name was probably given to you before you had any idea who you were, so how can it really repre-



sent your identity? Your name may have changed during your life. You may have adopted an alias or changed your name when you married or went through a personal transition.

My name has never changed. Named after my father John

and grandfather Lou, I never had a middle name, which caused some consternation as I was growing up. But with a name like mine, there's hardly a reason for a middle name.

People formed impressions of me based on my name, often erroneous impressions. One person told me, "I thought you'd be a tall black woman." When my name came up repeatedly in a conversation many years ago that I wasn't part of, someone interrupted and asked, "Who is this John Lu, this Chinese fellow, you keep mentioning?" Yet, I was not confused about my race, gender or height.

Our identities are a complex mix of facts, experiences, characteristics, hopes and dreams. Basic identifying information such as birthplace, family name, gender, gender identity, and race may carry richer meaning and implications than we imagine. Certainly, simply stating them doesn't begin to disentangle what they mean.

Pieces of our identity may be in our awareness constantly, while we forget or reject other pieces entirely. Our identities may be fragmented or integrated, fully embraced or have pinches of discomfort. My name, for instance, I hated when I was growing up. I wished to be Susan or Jane or Michellesomething normal. But I grew into Jonalu, and let go of the discomfort of it. Though if waitstaff in a restaurant ask me name, I tell them "JJ" for simplicity.

Always, identity is in a context where others are reading who we are and forming their own opinions about who we are, which may or may not coincide with what we believe to be true about ourselves. Sometimes, those observations by others may change how we see our own identity. Sometimes, our identity evolves with our experiences.

Any way you look at it, "Who am I?" is one of the most basic questions we have to answer about ourselves. And the answer may never be complete.

NEWS FROM THE STRATEGIC PLANNING COMMITTEE

Strategic Planning Committee chair Kathleen Tanona (537-6208 or kmtanona@hotmail.com), offers this report:

I wanted to update you on where our committee is with our exploration into facilities. I wrote last month that we had received a site assessment and expansion plan from Bowman and Associates. We recently received a cost analysis for building additions, parking renovations and landscape. This includes addressing our drainage issues within the landscape that continue to plague our upper lot and driveway. It is very exciting to see and I hope to share these drawings and plans in the near future. Our committee also decided to look at options that would give us a space in town, either with a new building, land to build or even a small UU house/meeting space. One avenue of exploration we are looking into is a shared space for both worship and social justice. The Mennonite congregation has purchased the lot at Poyntz and 9th, an ideal location. A couple of our members and Reverend Jonalu met with Pastor Barb Gehring and a couple of their members to discuss what they have planned and if there was any common ground to be explored. We were delighted to list many common goals of our congregations and we had a longer list of "pros" in comparison to "cons." The Mennonites are a Christian based religion, they do not have a creed and their symbol is a dove with an olive branch, not a cross. Peace and social justice are at the core of their beliefs. The ministers have agreed to a pulpit exchange this upcoming Spring as a next step. The Strategic Planning committee will be preparing a report to present to the Board and then we hope to be talking with the larger congregation. Please let me know if you have any questions or concerns.

RelmageMHK approached Rev Johnstone to ask if the Fellowship would publicly support changing the MHS mascot. In accordance with our Bylaws, the congregation must first discuss and vote on whether UUFM should issue a public statement of support. The resolution to be considered:

The Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Manhattan (UUFM) stands with RelmageMHK to support removing Native American ("Indian") mascots from our community schools. UUFM feels the evidence that such mascots harm youth, including the documented fact that they lead our youth to hold over-simplified and erroneous ideas about present day native people, present a moral dilemma that can only be resolved by phasing out the use of Native American mascots in our community's schools. UUFM understands that this transition may take time, but nonetheless asserts that the decision must be made, now, to end the use of Native American mascots in our community schools.
