

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE

A COMMUNITY OF TRANSFORMATION?

Let mystery have its place in you; do not be always turning up your whole soil with the plowshare of selfexamination, but leave a little fallow corner in your heart ready for any seed the winds may bring, and reserve a nook of shadow for the passing bird; keep a place in your heart for the unexpected guests, an altar for an unknown God. -- Henri-Frederic Ariel

Make a bit of room. Leave a little space. That may not sound like anything radical or revolutionary. But it turns out that it is one of Life's favorite ways to make us into something new.

Be cautious with those cultural messages about aggressively tilling and turning up your whole soil. Watch out for all the heroic talk about striving and perfecting, struggle and control. Much of the time, transformation is a much subtler art. It's about stillness, listening and waiting to be led, not fighting with yourself and others to make sure you are in the lead.

In short, when it comes to transformation, the message of spirituality is "Be careful with what you've been taught and told because much of it takes us in exactly the wrong direction." Our challenge as a community of transformation is to remind each other to take a different tack. More often than not, it's about breathing rather than becoming better; patience not perfection; depth not dominance; attention not improvement; seeing things from a different perspective, not pushing forward our current one.

That part about attention instead of improvement is especially important. It's so easy to get transformation mixed up with fixing. And fixing is transformation's biggest foe. Fixing brings technical change--replacing version 2.0 with version 2.1. Transformation is adaptive change, growing into a whole new reality; one we cannot even imagine when we start. Trying to purify or prove ourselves is the surest way to stay stuck in the old reality. The pursuit of purity focuses us on our inadequacy and inferiority, causing us to overlook those unexpected guests that Henri-Frederic speaks of.

And, friends, we don't want to miss those unexpected guests! Those seeds brought by the wind and those passing

birds are the partners that make transformation possible. They help us notice new paths. They invite us to walk with a new step. They awaken in us new songs. They remind us that transformation is not something we do alone. They assure us that transformation doesn't have to be a long and lonely struggle, but instead can be more like learning a new dance with a new friend. All we have to do is trust, take the hand of that "unknown God" and follow its lead.

So, friends, this month, leave some room on that dance floor of yours. Keep your eyes peeled. And when that unexpected guest reaches out its hand, don't be afraid.

Here at the intersection of risk (March's theme) and transformation (April's theme), I pause to observe our context.

Our fellowship has committed itself to being a visible beacon of liberal religious messages of hope and meaning in our local community. That means taking risks to create transfor-



mation. The first requirement when we speak about transformation is letting go of the idea that we know what we will look like ten years from now. If we knew, we wouldn't be welcoming real transformation.

At a recent service, we

invited consideration of various ways the congregation could change. Some probably make you make you nervous. Some feel unthinkable. What if the congregation were only virtual? What if it met sometime other than on Sunday? Such ideas are improbable. Others, though, are more feasible--and more immediate--than some might think.

If we are to have the capacity to grow in the ways that the congregation has agreed to, change is required. Our parking lot is full most Sundays; that keeps other people from joining us. At least three-quarters of the time, we are more than three-quarters full in the sanctuary. That also discourages people from joining us. Our children and youth, especially the teens, have makeshift space, rather than a place of their own.

Our Strategic Planning Committee continues to look at longterm options in terms of expansion of our building or moving to a new location. But we need change sooner than that can be accomplished.

The Executive Board has agreed on the appointment of a task force to look at moving to two services. This would be a huge step that would affect many aspects of our community, including religious education, music, greeting, fellowship, and more. We will be careful and strategic about how to proceed. But if we wish to grow in the ways the congregation has committed itself to, we have to make some changes.

In the meantime, if you can park across the street at the nursery on Sunday mornings, please do. If you're willing to

sit towards the front the sanctuary, that's great too. Help us leave room for others.

NOTES ON PROPOSED 2017/2018 BUDGET

The UUFM Board recommends this budget for your approval. Various committees and individuals submitted budget requests based on the Congregation's vision and plans for the coming year. Total expenses are estimated to be \$176,660. This is an increase of 2.16% over last year's approved budget of \$172,930.

Payroll makes up almost 75% of our budget, or \$131,593. The Board included a \$1000 raise for Rev Johnstone in this budget to bring her in line with UUA recommendations. It includes small raises for our other dedicated staff.

The Lay Leadership line has been reduced to zero for this year because we have access to some funds from the Lay Leadership Fund at the Community Foundation. We also reduced the Building Contingency Fund to zero for this year because the Facilities Committee has doubled its budget request to make a possible change to the Jupiter Room to increase the number of RE rooms available. This, frankly, is still under discussion, but we wanted to plan for it. Last, Facilities is also proposing to make electrical improvements in the Alsop room so we can plug in more coffee pots! These are the major changes in the budget.

How to pay for this? Give generously. We hope to increase pledged money by about 20% through new pledges and increases. Previous pledges to help with the ministerial transition are still expected this coming year. Favorite fund raising activities will continue. And the deficit will be covered using funds set aside in a ministerial transition savings account two years ago. Thank you for your continued support.
