A PEOPLE OF EMERGENCE?


During this time of year, it's not just farmers but us all who turn to the work of "tilling and turning up our whole soil." All around us, the culture shouts its heroic talk about striving and perfecting. Struggle is the dominant metaphor of the day. We talk of "fighting" to become all we can be. Images of sprouts breaking through concrete start showing up everywhere. Yet, we need to be careful because, more often than not, emergence and transformation is a much subtler art. It's about stillness, listening and waiting to be led, not conquering, struggle and taking charge.

In other words, when it comes to emerging into something new, the message of spirituality is "Be careful with what you've been taught and told because much of it takes us in exactly the wrong direction." As a people of emergence, we are called to take a different tack. We've been entrusted with the wisdom that emergence is most often about breathing rather than becoming better, patience not perfection, depth not dominance; acceptance not striving, attention not constant improvement.

That part about attention instead of improvement is especially important. It's so easy to get transformation mixed up with fixing. And fixing is emergence's biggest foe. Trying to perfect or prove ourselves is the surest way to stay stuck. The pursuit of constant improvement and perfection focuses us on our inadequacy and inferiority, causing us to overlook those unexpected guests that Henri-Frederic speaks of.

And, friends, we don't want to miss those unexpected guests! Those seeds brought by the wind and those passing birds are the partners that make emergence possible. They help us notice new paths. They invite us to walk with a new step. They awaken in us new songs. They remind us that new life is not something we do alone. They assure us that transformation doesn't have to be a long and lonely struggle, but instead can be more like learning a new dance with a new friend. All we have to do is trust, take the hand of that "unknown God" and follow its lead.

So, this month, make a bit of room. Leave a little space. Keep your eyes peeled, on the lookout for the unexpected. These directions may not sound like anything radical or revolutionary. But it turns out that these are often Life's favorite ways to help us emerge into something new. And when that unexpected guest reaches out its hand, make sure you're ready to take hold.

What might UUFM emerge into?

The world of religion today is different from the world many of us grew up with. Church--or any religious institution--feels optional to most people. More and more people define themselves as "spiritual but not religious," or as "nones," having no particular affiliation. A lot of people find them-



A lot of people find themselves moving from one religious group to another, sometimes in very wide jumps--Methodist to Mormon to Muslim, Baptist to Buddhist to Baha'i; often with stretches of nothing at all in between, or as the final destination. And many people decide they don't need or

want a religious home, preferring to explore at their own pace, or not at all. On top of that, people are skeptical of religious organizations, afraid they are after their money or have some hidden agenda.

So, religious communities are increasingly finding themselves floundering. Numbers like attendance and new members flag. Volunteers are stretched so thin in their lives that it's hard to find time to help out. And, congregations are notoriously slow to adapt to new technologies.

We UU's may be unsure of what to do with these societal trends, but we like skeptics. Many of the spiritual explorers out there could find connection and community within Unitarian Universalism, if we are open and inviting to them. That also means fearlessly stepping outside of old patterns and approaches and finding new ways to connect.

The Soul Matters packets this month emphasize how emergence doesn't come by force but by leaving the space to allow a natural opening up. We can watch that in plants that grow out of the ground. They need to have enough space and protection to push their heads up out of the earth.

How does that apply to where our fellowship is? We have been in discussions about the potential of moving from our current building. We are exploring possibilities for two different styles of worship services. Our leadership is considering how to reorganize to move away from unwieldy committee structures that no longer work well in a digital world. We are keeping our eyes open for what may come. And trying to change with it. We can't rush to decisions but have to allow what is right to emerge.

I can't imagine what UUFM will look like twenty years from now. What I know is, that something different from how we look today will emerge. It must, if we intend to thrive as the future evolves.

TREASURER'S NOTES ON PROPOSED 2018/2019 BUDGET

In January 2018, the Congregation voted to extend Rev Jonalu Johnstone's contract for three more years. This measure was approved knowing that, at this time, the number of members and pledging levels could not fully support a full-time minister. The Board has the authority to use up to 5% of expendable endowment funds to fill the gap until such time as we could fully support the ministry.

In addition, UUFM's longtime volunteer music director, Michael Oldfather, is retiring. The Board recommends we hire Renea Reasoner on a quarter time (10 hours per week) basis to fill this position. She has been one of our pianists for five years. Renea has a degree in music from KSU, teaches private lessons, and is active in other music activities. Her compensation will increase by approximately \$6,800. The planned Classroom Coordinator positions were never filled, and it was agreed to eliminate that budget item at this time.

The Facilities Committee has made a request to upgrade the audio-visual equipment for the Sanctuary. This will include a projector mounted on the back wall, a laptop, and other items necessary to make video presentations better and allow the AV team to operate it from the video/sound corner. The AV team gets requests for video presentations for 3 of 4 Sundays now. The cost is estimated to be \$5000.

With these major items included and budget requests from various other committees, the UUFM Board recommends this budget for your approval. Total expenses are estimated to be \$182,937. This is an increase of 3.5% over last year's approved budget of \$176,660.

Payroll is almost 76% of our budget, or \$139,514. The Board recommends raises of approximately 2% this year for our dedicated staff and minister. Note: this is half of what the UUA recommended this year, but we felt that in our environment and situation, this was more appropriate.

A pledge drive is forthcoming. You will be contacted again to see if you can increase your level of giving. In addition, we need to expand our base of support and share the great experience we have being a part of this congregation. Have you told your friends about UUFM? Have you invited them to come see what we're about? Have you told them about our children's program? We have a great thing here and we need to share it.
