

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE

A PEOPLE OF VISION?

"What will mess you up most in life is the picture in your head of how it is supposed to be." -- Author unknown

What?! Isn't that picture in our heads of "how it's supposed to be" what vision means? Yes, and at the same time, we have to understand the limits of the pictures in our heads.

Yes, we need to "stay true to our vision." Yes, "Without vison, the people perish." Yes, without a clear vision, we're vulnerable to whatever winds blow. A clear vision anchors us. It gives us direction and hope. It is, indeed, a precious thing to which we should hold fast.

But as the anonymous quote above tells us, all that holding fast is also dangerous. In short, no vision is perfect. We all look through some lens--it may magnify, it may project. These functions may be useful to help us see what we otherwise couldn't. But lenses bend the light that passes through them. Just as lenses bend the light, so do our visions. Every vision distorts even as it clarifies.

On top of that, life changes. Some doors close, new ones open. If you cling to a vision based in a reality that no longer exists, you'll just end up spending your life banging your head against the wall. And while having to let go of precious visions and dreams is painful, it's also exhilarating to evolve and grow.


As Unitarian Universalists, we also know that one vision isn't enough. As clear as our perspectives may be, we all know by now that none is complete. To see the entire view, we need everyone's vantage point. Besides being dangerous, holding tightly to one single vision is also just no fun! We don't just *have to* see things from others'

points of view; we *get to* see things from others' points of view! Learning about the visions of others isn't just a way of making up for your flawed perspective. It's also an invitation to see the world anew!

So clearly being a people of vision is hard work. Knowing when to stay true to your vision and when to let go is a very tricky task. Figuring out when to keep your vision front and center and when to de-center it and make room for others intimidates the best of us.

A people of vision must see clearly, look ahead and acknowledge the limitations and distortions of their own sight.

At UUFM, we seek to create our vision--living out our roles as safe haven and beacon, incubators and builders. Join us through the month of September to focus your lens.

where you spend time and make connections with people, a place "where everyone knows your name," as they say in the *Cheers* theme song. Our Director of Religious Education Sandy Nelson has

been talking lately about the concept of a "third place," and how that relates to building community in our fellowship and helping everyone feel part of us.

Of course, just as a church is not the building, but the people, a third place does not need to be confined to a literal single place or location. Many of our activities, of course, happen at the UUFM building--Sunday mornings, for example! Every month, though, there's a Family Fun activity sponsored by religious education, often somewhere in the community. The first Friday of the month, some of our folks gather at Annie Mae's for Beer and Theology. Some of our women gather twice a week on Monday and Thursday mornings for conversation at the West Loop McDonalds. I meet up with our Meadowlark residents (and anyone else interested) at Meadowlark once a month for a program, generally about our month's theme. The Book Discussion Group and some of our Chalice Circles meet in people's homes. And I regularly hold coffeehouse hours at various Radina's around town.

Our connections also deepen when we encounter each other out in the community. For example, the Drag Queen Story Hour that Little Apple Pride recently sponsored at the library included several of our families. Not only do we as adults need to recognize the connections we have with one another, but our children and youth may be especially grateful to run into other people they can feel confident share some of their values. That makes for a stronger sense of community and bonding.

As we enter a new school year, re-energized and reengaged, help us think how UUFM can become more of a third place to more people. Here are a few ideas. It would be great to see the monthly K-State lunch restarted, and/or Game Night resurrected. Maybe people would like to see a movie or show or lecture together and go out for a meal or snack before or after. If there are ways you think of, talk with me and let's see what we can start. Often, all it takes is a volunteer to coordinate it.

Or maybe, it's a matter of considering how you could connect with already existing groups--the Wednesday Men's Lunch, the Women's Coffee Group, the Book Club, Beer and Theology or one of the Chalice Circles. Whatever you're interested in, we can help you make a deeper connection.

So, see you at UUFM ... Or someplace else in the community!

FALL AND BEYOND

For the past few years I've been ruminating about how we "bridge" our youth from RE classes to the adult services. Turns out, I'm not alone. While attending UUA General Assembly I attended several workshops where that was a hot topic. (If you're interested as well, let me know. I'd love to bend your ear about it.). An idea that has surfaced, as Jonalu and I have been talking, is to simply have more services that include EVERYONE. Jonalu has named them "service for all ages" and we'll have them once a month (if anyone would like to help me make "busy bags" for the sanctuary, let me know). The rest of the month, for the elementary classes, we'll continue to use themes as well as our quarter system with Unitarian Universalism, Jewish and Christian Heritage, World Religions, and our summer program in the fourth quarter.

The teens (7th-12th grade) will be adapting the Neighboring Faiths curriculum to include more UU comparison components along with their field trips to other houses of worship. Older teens, especially those who have already been through the Neighboring Faiths curriculum, are en-

couraged to help with RE classes. (One of those bridging topics is the notion that the more youth are included in the workings of the church, the more likely they are to remain a UU.)
