

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE

A PEOPLE OF WHOLENESS?

Let's just say that we're skeptical about rushing in to fix things.

We Unitarian Universalists understand the urge to restore what once was. Nothing is more human. Who doesn't want to reverse the damage? Who doesn't hold on to the humpty dumpty hope that all can be put back together again? But our faith teaches us that this is just not how the world works. Transition and change rule the flow of life. There is no going back. The current of time is just too strong.

And so the wholeness offered us is not that returning our lives to their original state but working with what remains to make something new. The shards are not pieces of a puzzle that needs put perfectly back together, but building blocks waiting to be molded into a yet to be imagined form. To be made whole again is to be reorganized, not restored.

Another way to put this is to say that there is freedom in the breaking. The cracks make room for creativity. That's not to minimize the pain. And it's certainly not a way of justifying tragedy as "part of God's plan." Rather, it's a call for us to perceive the broken pieces of our lives as more than just a pile of worthless and ruined rubble. "Look closer," says our faith, "that ash, if worked with, can give birth to a Phoenix."

So, what piles of rubble in your life need revisited? What longing for what was needs let go so a new wholeness can emerge?

And how might you break open even further? Because that's part of this too, isn't it? "Your broken pieces are more than rubble" is not the only counterintuitive thing our faith tells us about wholeness. It also urges us to "Crack wider!"

As odd as it sounds, we were meant to be broken, broken open to be exact. Over and over again, our faith reminds us that protecting our personal wholeness is only half the game. The equally important part of life's journey is about letting in the wholeness of world!

It's about cultivating cracks on purpose. It's about becoming intentionally exposed. As Leonard Cohen famously put it, "Cracks are how the light gets in."

Broken hearts hurt but they also let in and allow us to connect with the pain of others. Protected hearts may seem safe, but our armor only ends up being a prison. It's one of the most important but paradoxical spiritual truths there is: Broken people end up bigger people.

So, in the end, maybe that's our most important "wholeness question": How are your cracks inviting you to become larger?

In February, our theme was trust. Have you noticed how the themes move into one another? We went from trust, to journey in March and to wholeness for this month. We need trust to make the journey. We need to journey to reach wholeness. As we strive for wholeness, I thought it might be a good time to revisit what it is that we trust.

During our Service for All Ages in February, everyone was invited to complete a link in the chain of trust that became our central art piece. Each person wrote a word or words about what they trust. As we disassembled the piece, I took note of different categories of trust. Many people noted family members or friends, either generically or by name. A few specified UUFM members, or the fellowship as a whole,



as people they trusted. Some named other particular categories of people--bridge partners or Vietnam vet buddies. Some named people they work with, customers, students, clients, even bosses. A number of people named themselves as

who they trust. Several people mentioned children or youth. Someone named the group Funds for Wildlife. There were a few interesting people who got unique mentions: people in need, the people who trust me, the people who give us confidence, and "anyone when I need help."

Then there were people-oriented answers that didn't relate to specific people. Among us, we have trust in the basic goodness of people, in civilization joining together for mutual benefit, in kindness, in fruits of human cooperation, and in the good will of others.

Values figured strongly for some: justice, empathy, growth, education, and even "our common values." One person paired empathy with spirit. Methodologies came up in answers like questioning, gut, "the process," intuition, reason, and logic. Several mentioned science or the scientific method in particular. At least one person trusted facts.

A few trusted particular assertions. "The sun comes up every morning with a fresh new day." "Life is full of opportunities." "There is good in the world." "We will have clean water to drink." "Things will turn out alright in the end." "Change will happen." In fact, change and growth received other endorsements.

Finally, one listed their dog as trustworthy.

Overall, our humanism came out strongly. Our connections with people, with one another, matter deeply and are a key place we turn to in need and in celebration. As we move forward together as a congregation, considering questions that will shape the future for Unitarian Universalism in Manhattan, may we remember who and what we trust and find ways to engage what matters most to us.



NOTES ON THE PROPOSED BUDGET

The Finance Committee, after reviewing UUA salary guidelines, and inline with our values and goals, recommended a 2% salary increase for the Minister, RE Director, Music Director, Administrator, and Janitor positions.

Communications has requested a \$500 increase to support more outreach activities.

Our recent spike in growth led Membership to request an additional \$150 to cover expenses for additional Pathways to Membership classes and new member socials, as well as new member packets.

RE requested an additional \$1,500 to sponsor an OWL training class for new facilitators.

The Facilities budget request is \$1,975 less than last year. However, there are two capital projects (brick spalling repairs and upper parking lot improvements) for which we will need to identify funding sources when proposed.

Our annual contribution to the UUA--which includes our contribution to the region--is increasing. This will be the first year using the new Annual Program Fund formula under which contributions are based on our expenses rather than membership numbers.

These changes led to an overall increase in expenses of 1.9%, or \$3,550, for a total of \$186,487.

To cover these expenses, we will rely on generous giving and endowment funds. With our membership increases this year, we are looking for a strong pledge drive to bring in \$150,000. Other fund raisers, income, and contributions are projected to make up another \$13,000 of revenue, leaving \$23,487. The \$1,771 for Leadership Development will come from money available to us from our permanent Greater Manhattan Community Foundation endowment. The plan for the remaining \$21,716 is to use returns on our expendable endowment investments at Vanguard.

WORDS FROM OUR CHAIR

Dear UU Friends and Family,

I hope you and yours are well. We have exciting things coming up at our Annual Congregational Meeting on Sunday, April 28, at 12:15 pm. In addition to voting on next fiscal year's budget and new board members, I invite you into a conversation about the future of our UUFM. While growth to sustain full-time ministry has been the main goal for several years, the time has come to make accommodations. We have grown to 131 members, a record high!

GROWTH - Overall attendance on Sundays has also increased, and studies show when seating approaches 80% of capacity, the room feels full and less welcoming. We do not want to deter guests--and members--from joining us, and if our sanctuary feels crowded, one can conclude there is no more space in our parking lot. Thus, the trend after a peak in attendance is a subsequent decline, because people feel crowded out, or think they will not be missed.

Two Services - In answer to this, the Sunday Services Committee is moving towards implementation of two Sunday services, possibly as soon as this Fall. This is one recommendation from the task force appointed a few years ago. They also advised services be one hour and of varying formats, perhaps one traditional service, and the other significantly different. Two services would distribute attendance, open up space in the sanctuary and parking lot, and provide the option of an alternative service format; however, it does come with challenges.

Feasibly, Religious Education for our youth could only be offered during one service, the other service might be multigenerational, or childcare may be provided without the educational aspect. Coffee time would likely be between the two services. Choir and other musical performances will be different. The need for conveners, speakers, and greeting teams will double. Assuredly, there are more unforeseen factors to a change like this.

RELOCATE? - Another option has presented itself: First Christian Church is for sale, just west of the Courthouse at 115 Courthouse Plaza, on the corner of 5th and Humboldt, located in the heart of downtown. Built in the early 1900s, with additions in the 1950s and 60s, the appraised value is \$1.28 million. One elevator accesses three of the four levels. The fourth level consists of six rooms out of 22 classrooms/offices throughout the building. There is double the sanctuary occupancy, which would allow us to keep to one service, a large fellowship hall and kitchen, 10 restrooms, and abundant storage space. Parking on Sundays is available on the street, at the Courthouse and UMB Bank, and in the public lot.

THE BIG PICTURE - The current status on sharing space with the Mennonites is on hold as they are focusing other issues at this time. That being said, we have important decisions to make. Two services at UUFM is inevitable, unless/until we make alternate arrangements. The task force advised against investing in a \$3.5 million ϵ on to our current site, as we would still have inadequate parking and not be located in town. It is hard to come by real estate in town. So we must ask ourselves: How do we want to grow? In what ways do we commit to sustaining full-time ministry? How do we live out our values and mission? And what does the future of UUFM look like?


