Jan Richardson starts off her poem by mentioning hunger. It's also a perfect way to begin framing this month's theme of belonging. We've all felt it. Just saying the word "belonging" conjures it up: The hunger to be included; the longing to be let in. No one likes standing outside the circle. No one likes leaning against the locked door listening to everyone laughing inside. From the time we are little, belonging is the thing we seek. It's the hoped-for Holy Grail at the end of our journeys.

Or is it just the beginning of our journey?

You have to love the way Richardson surprises us with that twist. One minute she's wrapping us in comforting words about settling into belonging and the next she's shaking us awake and telling us to get up and go. And maybe what she's

really waking us up to is the fact that there are two types of belonging, only one of which is a blessing.

To use her language, if you find yourself being invited to linger rather than leave, warning bells should go off. Be wary of those who welcome you with a club jacket and soft couch. They may have let you in, but soon they will enlist you to help with the work of keeping others out.

Instead, as all the true sages and sacred traditions tell us, the true blessing of belonging isn't that you get to come inside the circle; it's that you get to participate in expanding it.

Which means maybe our question this month is different than one we might expect. Instead of "Where can I find belonging?" maybe it's "How can I become belonging for others?"

May that be the question and the type of belonging this month that--to use Richardson's words--"will not leave any of us alone."

I'm continually amazed at who feels they belong and who feels they don't belong. Not because of any particular qualities of either group, but because feelings of belonging seem so unpredictable. This can be especially pronounced in a congregational setting because of our expectations of church.

Of course, some feeling out of place can be easy to explain.



If I'm different from everyone else around me in some pronounced way--the language we speak, our racial or ethnic heritage, our interests and enthusiasms, our politics or religion--it can be very tough to feel bonded. When people ask me

why our congregation is so white, this is an obvious part of the explanation. It's hard to feel welcome if everyone seems different from you. Breaking out of those strong cultural constraints is not easy.

But so much goes into that feeling of belonging in a congregation or anywhere. Some people who appear very well-connected feel isolated and lonely, separate from the congregational community. Some people who rarely show up to anything feel a deep bond with the congregation. I can't understand, much less explain, this disconnect between appearances and feelings. Except to say that feelings are based on a lot more than what goes on on the surface.

Belonging, then, is a deeply subjective experience. No one else will ever be able to feel what you feel or fully grasp what you go through. Yet, there is comfort in feeling understood (at least in part), in fitting in, in finding a sense of belonging. Comfort we all want.

So much of our sense of belonging depends on our child-hood. Did we feel unconditional love? Did we believe we had a place in our family? Did we develop a confidence in ourselves that we could rely on when we encountered others? Did we find a sense of security in our place in the universe?

And if we didn't find it in childhood, how did we seek it as we grew to adulthood? Or ensconced in that sense of security in childhood, have we searched to find the same as adults? Did it elude us? When we are children, we can expect others to create that belonging for us, but having

grown up, our sense of belonging relies more and more in our own ability to seek it, to find it, or to create it.

In a congregation, that responsibility becomes mutual. Together, we create a place not only for ourselves, but also for others. We make room and make way. We offer our-selves to one another so that mutually, we belong to one another.

Such belonging is no easy matter. It takes awareness, intentionality, and mutual concern. I am so glad that in this congregation, people take care of one another-imperfectly, perhaps--but the effort is clear and the results show. We all have the job of creating welcome and crafting belonging for ourselves and others.

Thank you for all you do to make this congregation a people of belonging.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS

We have officially begun our school year programming. We started in early September with a "Safety Day" where students learned what to do in case of fire, tornado, etc. (It was fun to discharge an old fire extinguisher in the parking lot.) So you know...we line the hallway in case of a tornado, and we meet our families near the big tree by the road if there's a fire.

Now we're on to our (roughly) age-divided classes. 7th-12th grades meet with Molly in the Jupiter room (it's a big group and they need the space). The "7-up class" is exploring the UUA Neighboring Faiths curriculum. They'll be having deep faith formation discussions along with field trips to other houses of worship.

Babies and toddlers are the center of the universe (or so they think) so the Nursery is our Sun room. We've hired a couple of folks to be nursery attendants so the Nursery is staffed every Sunday. However, we're always in the market for sitters. If you know anyone who might be interested please ask them to contact me. Maybe a student from the high school or university?

The PreK-Kindergarten-1st grade group "PreK-K-1" meets in the Mercury room. They're using the UUA curriculum, "Chalice Children" which aims to get students comfortable with the fellowship through stories, activities, and the seven principles. Susan Rensing and Christie Launius rotate as the teachers of that class.

2nd-4th graders meet in the Neptune room (formerly the stage). Matt Sayre is the lead teacher of this group but we could use a substitute now and then. If you're interested, let me know. First quarter is all about Unitarian Universalism and they use the UUA Tapestry of Faith curriculum, "Love will Guide Us" as well as the classic "Picture Book Unitarian Universalism."

The 5th-6th graders meet in the Alsop room (or outside in nice weather). They also start the year with Unitarian Universalism and have rotating teachers. They'll explore faith formation using the "Lodestone" curriculum and the "Spirit of Adventure" curriculum. Both of those have some fun activities perfect for this energetic age group (the Mentos and Coke lesson is wonderful!).

UPDATE FROM THE TREASURER

HELPING HANDS

We began an experiment back in February to give all of the collection plate money (not marked for UUFM) each month to that month's Helping Hands recipient. While there are several variables that make it difficult to identify exactly how this is impacting the Fellowship's operating finances, one thing is for sure: we should be very proud of our increased contributions. Below is a table showing increases we have seen over the experiment period from the same period of the previous year. During the Board's annual retreat, the Board decided to continue this experiment and revisit the policy at the March 2020 Board meeting.

PLEDGE DRIVE

A group of volunteers has been contacting members all summer regarding their pledges. If you haven't heard from someone yet, expect to soon. To date, we've received pledges totaling \$104,660 from 46 pledge units. Many increases from last year. Thank you for your generosity. Making some reasonable assumptions, our total increases to \$130,500 from 56 pledge units.

FACILITIES PROJECTS

The facilities committee has recommended that we hire Hartman Masonry to fix the brick spalling on the southern and western exterior walls for the quoted amount of \$14,400. The board approved the project at its September meeting under the condition that we receive congregational approval to transfer the funds from expendable endowment. A congregational meeting will be held on October 20. Earlier this year, we held a similar meeting to request approval to transfer funds for roof repairs. Several members donated funds, totaling \$7,405.50, that reduced the endowment transfer to \$19,335.50. Thank you for the support!
