We know the usual "integrity advice:" Build your character! Get better at being honest, with others and yourself!

It's about addition, we're told. Being better. Becoming more.

But our faith, like Rachel Naomi Remen, says it's more complicated than that. Some subtraction is also needed. Removal needs to occur. The path needs cleared.

And why? Well because integrity isn't simply something we build; it's something already there. We UUs talk mostly about inherent worth, but we also believe in inherent integrity. All the building blocks are sitting there, waiting. They are, as Remen says, hidden like something we have put in the back of the drawer long ago.

It's all a reminder that our integrity is much more closely tied to memory than we acknowledge. Those moments from our youth when we felt most truly ourselves. Those mentors and models that departed wisdom

about what really matters. It's all there. Just forgotten. As the poet, Charles Bukowski says, "Can you remember who you were, before the world told you who you should be?"

So friends, please don't make this month just about "being better." Make some time to also be quiet. Think of the hunt for integrity more like getting away from all the noise of the traffic so the song of the birds can be heard. Or like when we wandered off a bit too far into the woods as a kid. It could have been scary, but somehow we knew that all we had to do was stand still and listen. We knew the call of our parents would soon come, leading us back home. It's the same with our memories and our deepest selves. They are calling to us from the edge of the woods.

All we have to do is stop and listen.

We are dedicated to challenging ourselves and society into wholeness.

A vibrant, inclusive congregation, UUFM is widely known as a safe haven and a force for social justice.

These words came together to describe our mission and vision after participation from almost half the membership on a December weekend. Yes, a weekend in December! I'm so impressed with the commitment of this congregation.



UUFM had not reviewed its mission for many years, and though the vision had been spelled out beautifully more recently, the length of the vision statement limited its usefulness. The new statements are short and powerful. Even a little scary.

If it weren't pushing ourselves, though, we would become stagnant.

Challenging ourselves is never easy, yet religion is all about becoming the best people we can be. Challenging society may be even harder. Saying out loud that the criminal justice system is broken and racist, that the Indian symbol for the high school is disrespectful, that there needs to be room in Manhattan for diverse religious expressions—these expressions of our faith challenge our community to grow in ways that may make a lot of people—even us—uncomfortable. Yet, that is what we dedicate ourselves to.

We want to be a safe haven, yes, and yet we want to be much more than that. We want to be a force for social justice. Many of our members come to UUFM looking for ways to engage in the social and political issues of our time, as well as to find a place where they are supported and comforted.

As we try on this mission and vision for size, we can think about how they help us to engage with the decisions we are making about the future of UUFM. We also can consider what they mean for our work in the world.

To that end, I'd like you to think about two different opportunities. First, on January 12, our Racial Justice Team will present a service that grew out of our engagement with the book *Just Mercy*, by Bryan Stevenson. We see issues of race deeply embedded in our criminal justice system, and feel called to respond to these issues. I hope you will come to that service and leave inspired to take something on, even if

it's a small step like self-education. We hope to see the movie together [see page 5 of this newsletter], as well, so maybe you can join us there.

The second opportunity for engagement is making a trip to the legislature. I recognize that UU's tend to be good citizens, consistent voters, and knowledgeable about the issues. If you want to take the next step, there are several opportunities to join with groups that share our values for lobby days. I know many of you cannot join in because of work and family commitments. It would be great, though, to see UU's represented to some extent at various lobby days. I'll list them in the newsletter [schedule and links on page 6], list serve and Facebook. If you'd like more information about any of them in particular, talk with me and/or check out the links I've included.

Our world needs more people challenging themselves and society. Our region needs a UU congregation as a safe haven and force for social justice. May we be what's needed.

THEMES IN UU HISTORY AND THEOLOGY

We meet on *SELECT SUNDAYS, BEFORE THE SERVICE*, at 9:30 am (dates vary). This year, we explore UU history and theology through a social justice lens. We'll dive deep on a few particular themes, discovering how Unitarians, Universalists, and Unitarian Universalists applied their theologies to work for justice in the world. *Let us know by the Wednesday before if you'll need childcare*.

- January 12 Civil Rights Where were UU's as civil rights became an issue in the 1960's? How did they respond to a divided society? In retrospect, the correct stance is clear. What do we have to learn from UU southern congregations about taking positions of conscience on divisive social issues?
- February 16 Black Empowerment and White Power The most contentious issue in the history of the UUA may be the response to Black Power within Unitarian Universalism. Controversy swelled in General Assemblies and congregations alike. To understand where we today in relation to racial justice ... to understand UUism today, we have to learn about this part of our history.
- MARCH 22 Women's Movement Though Unitarians and Universalists were active in women's rights since the 19th century, women began to come fully into their power within Unitarian Universalism theologically, politically, and even artistically, in the 1970's. The Women and Religion Resolution in 1977 led to surprising places.
- **APRIL 19 UTOPIANISM** A number of nineteenth century Unitarians and Universalists established utopian communities. That's only one way that utopianism has shaped our theological and social justice practices. Does utopianism contribute to successful social justice movements?
- MAY 17 FREE SPEECH The 1950's brought repression of freedom of speech to America. Among those called to testify before the House of Representative Committee on Un-American Activities (ironically named) were Unitarian clergy. What does free speech mean to us today, and how do we ensure we can exercise it?

SEARCHING FOR THE FUTURE WORKSHOP RESULTS

The Executive Board invited Barry Finklestein to run the "Searching for the Future" Workshop in order to develop our new Mission and Vision Statements. The workshop was held at UUFM December 14 and was well-attended by 53 congregants, almost half of our membership! A committee of facilitators completed a three-hour training session the evening before. Our facilitators were Judy Nickelson, Scott Tanona, Eli Martinson, Elke Lorenz, Marisa Larson, Mark Clarke, and Jessica Sievers. These volunteers dedicated six to 18 hours, or more (Eli), over just those two days. We also want to thank everyone who participated, made childcare possible, brought food, and helped with setup and cleanup to make this workshop a success.

Through Sunday's service December 22, if one looked around the sanctuary, one would see just a sampling of the large flipchart papers covering three of the sanctuary's walls from the six three-hour sessions. Workshop attendees had opportunities for personal reflection, brainstorming, and smaller-group collaboration. At the end of each session, the goal was to have each group adapt their own mission and visions statements. If it sounds like three hours was a long time, it went by fast! If it sounds like a challenge, it was! During the wrap-up session with Barry and Jonalu, the facilitators' task was to take all of this information and boil it down to two sentences: our new **UUFM MISSION** AND **VISION** STATEMENTS!

A mission statement is a concise, powerful statement of our core reason for being: "We are dedicated to challenging ourselves and society into WHOLENESS."

The vision statement is the image of an ideal future five years hence: "A VIBRANT, INCLUSIVE CONGREGATION, UUFM IS WIDELY KNOWN AS A SAFE HAVEN AND A FORCE FOR SOCIAL JUSTICE."
