

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A PEOPLE OF **IMAGINATION?** (from Soul Matters, adapted for UUFM)

Maybe our most important work is to re-imagine imagination.

Imagination's great gift is *improvement*. At least that is what we're usually taught. The deep magic lies in the way it can reshape our reality. We are urged to imagine the world we dream of. A world with more justice. More peace. More love. From that, a mysterious magnetism arises, a magnetism that pulls our imperfect present into an improved future. Imagination moves us forward. It makes us better.


Yet there's a way in which this view of imagination impoverishes us. It steals the stage. Shuts out imagination's *other* precious gifts.

For instance, think of what happened when you got out of bed this morning. After a shower and a cup of coffee, you didn't just pull on fresh clothes, you also pulled out a jewelry box and slipped on your grandmother's ring. As you slid it on your finger, she slid, not just into your memory, but into your day. Now, because of imagination, you aren't just elegant; you're *accompanied*. Or how about that invisible friend of yours when you were a child? Imagination made sure you didn't travel through those early years alone. It conjured up a loyal friend. Even today, amidst the hustle and bustle of adult life, tell me you don't hear the guidance of ancestors and friends all

day long. It's all one giant reminder that imagination doesn't just improve our lives, it populates it.

And *illuminates* it too. That's right. Imagination isn't just a force that drives us forward toward a more perfect future, it also pulls the sacred into our impoverished present. Imagination is what transforms trees from potential firewood into wise friends. Imagination is what moves us from lording over the natural word to seeing ourselves as part of it. It gives the world a soul. And not just the natural world, but the ordinary world too. Through the lens of imagination, we perceive the common as precious, even miraculous. The laughter of our children becomes the sound of angels. Sunshine on our face becomes a greater treasure than gold. Our "everyday" lives are understood as amazing adventures and inexplicably lucky gifts.

So friends, this month, do everything you can to soak in *the many* messages of imagination. It's not just shouting, "Improve the world!" It's also pleading, "Let the world come alive!"

Never, ever has there been a year I was more ready to say good-bye to than 2020!

There's no need to review all that has been wrong about the last year as we welcome 2021. Still, we have to recognize that these divisions into years are human created and somewhat arbitrary. Cultural trends continue across datelines without even hesitating.

After all, even though we have a vaccine, the pandemic is not over. Though we will have a new US President this month, political divisiveness has not died down. Racism remains rampant, with increases in hate crimes and even murders. Authoritarianism remains a growing concern. And, it's not just in the US. The trends are global. 2020 is coming to an end, but the challenges are not.

I recently read an article

(https://theconversation.com/history-repeats-itself-thats-badnews-for-the-2020s-127116) dated January 2, 2020, nearly a year ago, by David Baker, an expert in Big History, a multidisciplinary approach that examines the largest patterns in history, from the Big Bang to future trends. Baker contends that the 2020's will likely be a time of decline, instability and violence. He foresaw a slow downward trend, unless a trigger event--which he saw only a low or moderate chance of-kicked off a more concentrated period of violence. Could a pandemic be a trigger event? Oh, yeah.

Any chance for avoiding these dread prospects? The only chance Baker saw was through technological breakthrough. "[I]nnovation," he writes, "remains our best hope, and the

sooner it happens the better."



So that's where this month's theme of imagination comes in. Already, we have seen wild, almost unimaginable, innovation with the incredibly rapid development of a vaccine.

That's not enough, though,

because the pandemic hasn't created all our problems. Many of them it has simply unearthed. The administration coming in may be equipped, because of its diversity, to yield imaginative solutions. And who knows what computer science and technology may be able to come up?

The fix isn't all technological or governmental, though. What innovations in thinking will it take to help us realize that race

and religion have too long divided us? What new worldviews are required to address climate change? If we are to do more than simply survive, how will we do it?

I wish I had the answers, but this year, more than any other, I have more questions than answers

JOIN A CHALICE CIRCLE!

Would you like to explore our monthly themes more deeply? Would you like to get to know a small group of UU's more closely? Perhaps, you'd like to explore our themes through a lens of racial justice.

Chalice Circles give an opportunity to grow in both intimacy and ultimacy, connecting with individual people so you know them and are known by them, and connecting with what is most ultimate, most holy in your own life. Since Rev Jonalu is retiring in August of 2021, we are in search of a minister. In an effort to be fully transparent with our congregation, and on behalf of the Ministerial Search Committee, I would like to apprise you of some changes.

First and foremost, the type of search for a minister has changed. Originally, we were in search for a three-quarter time "settled" minister. Note that Rev Jonalu voluntarily reduced her full-time position to three-quarter time this past year. From the Annual Meeting minutes, April 26, 2020: "Settled ministry is different from any ministry we've had before. Jonalu is a developmental minister and previous ministers have been contract ministers. Settled ministry is a long-term commitment between congregation and minister and therefore is a more involved process." At that meeting we voted to invest around \$15,000 in the ministerial candidate. This would cover travel expenses and hosting the candidate for a week of getting to know them, and them being introduced to the congregation and the Manhattan area.

Enter coronavirus pandemic. Full disclosure: I have not been my best, and I have struggled. I reached out to the UUA Transitions Program Manager Christine Purcell, for help with our settled ministry search. She said we are not the only ones struggling; half of the almost 50 congregations have dropped out of settled search. The good news is, Christine made the recommendation that we apply for a "contract-to-call" minister (a short-term contract with the option to call). I discussed this with the Ministerial Search Committee, and invited Christine to a Zoom Q&A with the Board.

With support from the UUA, Ministerial Search Committee, and Board, moving forward with a "contract-to-call" search makes the most sense during these uncertain times. Currently, a ministerial candidate will not be able to travel and stay a week to get to know us, and us them. Instead, getting acquainted will occur virtually. While this would save us a large expense, it does not seem fair to anyone in this situation to commit to a long-term settled minister position. Our hope is that a contract-to-call minister will love our congregation, and Manhattan, as much as we do, and over a couple of years the feeling will be mutual and we can call the minister to stay longer.

Who are your Ministerial Search Committee members? I, Jessica Sievers, am your chair. It is my honor to work with Molly McGaughey, Susan Rensing, Scott Tanona, Larry Weaver, Marisa Larson, and to have Lily Colburn for an alternate. This committee was chosen from nominations provided by Fellowship members and/or Board-appointed to round out the representation of the committee. The committee was unanimously approved by the congregation at the Annual April meeting.

The committee's goal is to uphold the best interest of our beloved congregation. Look for more updates in the future. In the meantime, please do not hesitate to contact me if you have questions about this process. I may be reached at 785 532-8471 or sieversj@gmail.com.




