Dear ones,

My first full month among you here in Manhattan has been a joyous whirlwind! Thank you for your warm welcome. I've enjoyed meeting you as a group and as individuals. Please continue to reach out with introductory emails and schedule visits to get to know me or request pastoral support.

It was perfect to arrive in town for our theme of Holding History. I took the opportunity to visit the Discovery Center and Council Grove and to begin reading the history of the



Flint Hills and Manhattan. I was grateful to hear history from many of you--your personal history, your experiences arriving in Manhattan, and your evolving connections with the Fellowship. It was satisfying to work with your fabulous conveners to encapsulate

your collective wisdom in our Sunday Services. I'm especially heartened by the deep commitment of the Racial Justice Team and others to make our land acknowledgement real through action. I look forward to the continuing collaborative art of weaving our history into the future.

This coming month, our theme is Opening to Joy. It is good timing, after holding history. Being rooted in honesty is essential for truly opening to joy. So much of our history includes sorrow and we have done good work naming it in November. Despite these preparations, the holidays are nonetheless challenging for many. Amid the good cheer and well wishes, it is very common to have grief. At the Fellowship, we welcome you exactly as you are, this month and every month. As William Blake says, "joy and woe are woven fine."

Though I myself find myself blue at times, Christmas *is* my favorite holiday. TREASURER'S REPORT - DAN SWENSON, UUFM TREASURER, <u>SWENSON.HOME@GMAIL.COM</u>

Greetings. In this Treasurer's report, I want to talk about ... our Helping Hands donations ... income and expenses, and finding [a volunteer] ... bookkeeper.

HELPING HANDS donations are very strong. Last year we donated a total of \$6,239 to agencies that provide support in the local community. The agencies are suggested to the Helping Hands Committee by the congregation and they fill out a simple application. The list of agencies for last year are listed below. This year the same agencies are participating and we are on track to equal or better our donations.

Boys & Girls Club - \$1,075 Shepherd's Crossing - \$50 Guardian Angels - \$385 Flint Hills Community Clinic - \$320 Crisis Center Inc - \$680 Sunflower CASA - \$280 Manhattan Emergency Shelter - \$682 Riley County Humane Society - \$518 UFM (Project EXCELL) - \$568 Kansas Abortion Fund - \$530 Wonder Workshop - \$725 Greater Manhattan Community Foundation - \$425

INCOME AND EXPENSES for the fiscal year (June 2021 to May 2022) are tracking where we need to be. Some members make their entire pledge payment at the beginning of the year, [so] we always start the year with more income than expenses. So far, income for this fiscal year is \$101,147. Total expenses are \$66,229. At this time last year total income was \$78,222 and total expenses \$70,655. We are still doing better than last year. However, income the past two months has been low, which gives some cause for concern. In December I'll send out letters to everyone on the status of their pledge and donations.

Being the **BOOKKEEPER** is a chance to learn QuickBooks and make a significant contribution to the Fellowship. Ten years ago, in a moment of weakness after she retired, Sandy Nelson was recruited to be our bookkeeper. She has been wonderful, but it is time to pass this job to another person.

The bookkeeper is responsible for depositing donations and paying the Fellowship bills. Once a month a spreadsheet summary is forwarded to the Treasurer, who uses this to make a report to the Board. Sandy says she spends 1 to 3 hours each week on this job. It is an important job to keep the Fellowship running. I am hoping that someone will be willing to step up. You WILL be appreciated. In October, we welcomed our new pastor, Rev Isabel Call. We accepted the resignation of at-large board member Deirdre Greeley and elected Ruddy Benavides to fill her term. Thank you, Deirdre, for your service and Ruddy for stepping in.

The Sunday Services Team is working on getting some new technology that will make it much easier to run the in-person and online service, something that was budgeted for this year.

In October, Lindsay Smith reported on building maintenance. The work on the outside of the building is finished and the new door to the Alsop room has been installed. New tile is being installed in the Alsop room and the ceiling in the Jupiter room is being fixed. Our faithful grounds volunteers have spruced up the outside of the building. The HVAC system is in good working order. Please let Lindsay know if there are issues in the building that need to be addressed.

In November, Kathy Swenson reported on the Social Action Team. The main functions of Social Action are choosing the monthly Helping Hands offering recipients (Kathy); stocking the Blessing Box at Wonder Workshop (Doug Walter); cooking and serving the Happy Kitchen breakfast every Friday morning at St Paul's Episcopal (Tom Phillips); and the Racial Justice Team that meets every third Sunday at 4 pm. Many members of UUFM also serve in community groups concerned with social justice including the Manhattan Alliance for Peace and Justice (MAPJ), Committee on Equal Justice (CEJ), the Manhattan Afghan Resettlement Team (MART), and others.

Doug appreciates everyone who stocks the Blessing Box or brings him items to stock. He checks it at least once every day. He would like to have some people he could count on to back him up for days he can't get there. Tom is always looking for regular volunteers or substitutes for Happy Kitchen. Social Action and Social Justice teams are open for everyone to get involved.

The Board will be asking the Racial Justice Team to conduct a congregational inclusion audit using a rubric developed by the Minnesota Unitarian Universalist Social Justice Alliance. There are many ways we could be more inclusive and welcoming. We could start by assuming that everything we read, write or speak is being heard by people not familiar with our congregation or Unitarian Universalism and putting ourselves in their shoes.

The Board has been contemplating our committee/ volunteer structure and the fact that some of our volunteers have been in their positions for a very long time. We will continue to work on these issues in the coming months.
