Or are we? "Courage doesn't always roar."

Courageous people change the world. So many examples of that this month. October's celebration of LGBTQ+ history month reminds us of the many who bravely moved (and continue to move) our world toward greater acceptance and affirmation. The revolutionary prophet of peace, Mohandas Gandhi, was born on October 2. Our Christian friends celebrate Reformation Day and Martin Luther's courage that changed how we all think about religious authority. We rightly honor such giants. The problem is most of us aren't that tall.

Here's what we have to help each other remember: In addition to the heroic acts that alter history, there are also the daily choices that prevent history from altering us! Bending the arc of the universe toward justice deserves praise, but so does the ordinary work of integrity and not allowing *yourself* to be bent.

We need to make room on the path for these common acts of courage. The bravery of embracing your beauty even when it doesn't fit the air-brushed images surrounding us. The courage of calling out microaggressions that occur daily

for many of us. And what about resisting the persistent seduction of status and stuff? Simply put, the list is long: Turning down that drink one day at a time. Making yourself get out of bed when the depression tells you to stay there. Holding your partner's hand in public. Make no mistake, there are dozens of ordinary acts of bravery we embody every day!

Or maybe we should say there are dozens of ordinary acts of bravery we help each other embody every day. This we need to remember as well. Courage is not only noble; it's contagious. The bravery that makes it into the history books may save the world, but our ordinary courage keeps each other going. Watching someone else make it through another day helps us endure. Witnessing someone else confront bigotry allows us to bravely be more open about who we are. They say that courage is found by digging deep, but most often it is passed on.

So don't worry so much if you haven't changed the world yet. And certainly let's stop comparing ourselves with those giants. Our work rests less in looking up to them and more in looking over at each other. And in remembering that others are looking over at and needing strength from us.

COURAGE AND FAITH

Courage is a remarkable trait--something we notice and celebrate. The way it's typically talked about, we don't really expect everybody to have it. But maybe we should. Maybe instead of practicing reverence for the demigods and superheroes who exhibit feats of extraordinary bravery and compassion, we can begin noticing all of the ways courage shows up in our lives. Maybe instead of looking for examples of profound courage in the world, we can get curious about each person we meet: what is their particular flavor of courage? Maybe before bed each night we can ask ourselves: how did my courage show up today? We can ask these questions knowing they have answers, confident that courage is ever-present; we just have to notice it.

Brené Brown writes that in one of its earliest forms, the word courage meant "To speak one's mind by telling all one's heart." Associating courage with brave acts can distract us from seeing the smaller scale expressions of our commitments to inwardly unshakeable truths. Mary Anne Radmacher points out that "Courage doesn't always roar. Sometimes courage is the quiet voice at the end of the day saying, 'I will try again tomorrow."

This month, as I move into full-time ministry here at UUFM, I am celebrating your individual and collective courage. A significant majority of our members voted "yes" to funding my full-time position even though we don't have proof that we will have the income to sustain it long-term. Our courageous community includes thoughtful people who disagreed and were willing to say so, out loud and through the democratic process. Having counted votes, we are taking the risk together, in dialogue, willing to share the consequences. Barbara Bonner believes that faith is intrinsic to courage-"faith in the truth of who we are and where that will lead us, faith in what we are doing and its importance and value in the lives of others." As a congregation, we have faith in our vision. And we have faith in each other.

It's going to take time, muscle, creativity, and faith to move through and beyond the pandemic, to move back fully into our building, and to move beyond outdated notions of "church." Each person's unique approach to community is relevant in this era when so many people who share our values are subsisting on disembodied commodified social interactions. So many assumptions we didn't even know we had are being renegotiated. It takes courage to keep a positive outlook. But it's way more fun than giving into pessimism and fear. I believe we (and our descendants) are going to look back on this social moment and smile, shocked

at our ignorance but impressed at our courage. And most importantly, grateful that we had each other.


FIREFLY OPEN CIRCLE - ALL HALLOW'S EVE, SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 5

A REPORT FROM UUFM BOARD CHAIR AMY BETZ

The Board has been very busy the past two months. At the August Board meeting, we voted to both move forward with the process to call Pastor Isa as well as to recommend increasing her current appointment to full time. We decided to separate these actions into two different processes. There were many reasons to make these separate but one reason was so we could immediately have more availability with Pastor Isa. Having a 3/4-time minister impedes our ability to move forward on many initiatives and we did not want to feel rushed or overwhelmed during the call process.

On Sunday, September 11th we held a congregational meeting to vote to change Pastor Isa's current appointment from 3/4-time to full time. I was extremely invigorated and excited to see such a great turn out for the meeting.

The discussion was thoughtful, lively, and a great representation of our shared values. Thank you to everyone that participated! The decision was in the affirmative, so Pastor Isa will begin her full-time schedule in October.

Next, we will move forward with the call processes. This is distinct from the vote on September 11th. In its simplest explanation; calling a minister is a formal acknowledgement of the partnership relationship between the minister and a congregation, which is more than an employment relationship. Instead of being bound by a contract with a known end date, we would covenant to work together until either the minister or congregation chose to end the partnership. With called ministry, the default state is that we will continue in a

mutually beneficial relationship. In many ways, we have been interacting with our ministers as if we called them, but we've never gone through the process to transition formally from contract ministry. The Board is currently in the process of selecting the Call Task Force to help us decide if we want to do this. This is a group of diverse individuals in our congregation that will be reaching out to get input from across the congregation. This is a new experience for us as a congregation and for Pastor Isa. We will all be learning in this process! If there is a recommendation to move forward with the call, we will have another congregational meeting. This will most likely be in December or January. Therefore, if you have any actionable feedback about the meeting on Oct. 11, please let me know as I will have the opportunity to reflect and implement changes. (Yeah for personal and professional growth!)

The Board also voted on an updated COVID policy [which may be reviewed at] https://uufm.net/covid-policy-and-resources/. We have added additional air filtration and relaxed some of the restrictions based on the additional air filtration. Most notably, when we are in the Orange risk level, we can still ALL sing during the service. Also, when we move back to the Yellow risk level (where we are now), masks will only be required in the Sanctuary and Narthex during Sunday Services. Masks will still be recommended in all other spaces and events. This allows us to still center the most vulnerable but be flexible with what we are able to achieve with our space.
